

# CITY PARISH NEWS.

Interesting Budget of Happenings Gathered by Our City Reporters

## CATHEDRAL.

Mrs. James Carney died at the family residence, 213 Saratoga avenue, on Tuesday last. The funeral was held Friday morning at 8.30 from the house, and at 9 o'clock from this church. Mrs. Carney leaves a husband, three sons, James, Michael and Peter, and two daughters, Mary and Nellie, to mourn the loss of a kind, loving mother.

James Nolan died Monday morning at the family residence, 239 Oak street, aged 67 years. He leaves, besides his wife, five sons, Andrew, James, John, Charles and Peter, and three daughters, Margaret, Hannah and Mary, and one brother, Peter Nolan, all of this city. Deceased was born in Ireland, came to this country forty years ago and settled in Rochester, where he resided continuously up to the time of his death.

Miss Nellie Coffey died Monday at the Homeopathic hospital, aged 33 years. The funeral was held from the home of George Cornwell, No. 10 Gleewood park, Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock, and from the church at 8.30 o'clock.

Wednesday evening, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. John Fahy, Mrs. Philip Kirley passed away to the beautiful sleep of the Christian soul, perfected in Christ. Hers was one of the lives whose sweetness and beauty of character was best known in the home circle where she formed so distinctive a feature, and where her beloved presence will be so sadly missed by her only remaining child and the grandchildren to whom she was ever so tenderly devoted.

She had passed through the greatest sorrows during her life, parting with her husband and many children, but throughout all these great trials her faith and beautiful resignation to the Divine will never faltered, even when the cup pressed to her lips seemed overflowing with bitterness.

Since the death of her husband, nine years ago, Mrs. Kirley has lived in the home of her daughter, brightening those about her with her ever cheerful presence, and the aching hearts to whom she was so dear will not cease to cherish the tender memory of the beautiful life that had been so long among them.

The funeral will be held from the residence, No. 248 East avenue, this morning at 9.30, and from the church at 10 o'clock.

Robert S. Moore and Miss Helen McDermott were married Wednesday at Bishop McQuaid's residence. Miss Lettie Bailey of Buffalo was bridesmaid, while Edward McDermott, brother of the bride, acted as best man. The young couple will make an extended tour in the east.

Frank R. Donnelly, son of Margaret and the late Samuel Donnelly, died Tuesday morning at the home of his mother, corner of Cameron and Otis streets, aged 30 years. Mr. Donnelly, who had been in poor health for some time, spent several months lately in the South, but derived but little benefit therefrom. He was for a number of years a trusted employee of the P. Cox Shoe Company, and later of the firm of Callahan & Cooper. He was a man of excellent habits and of genial disposition, and his death will be a severe blow to his many friends. He leaves his mother and one brother, Charles Donnelly. The funeral was held Thursday morning at half past 8 o'clock and at 9 o'clock from St. Patrick's Cathedral. The bearers were: P. Vincent Mahon, Charles J. Madden, George Bantel, Samuel Henry, Herman Pohl and Bernard O'Reilly.

## ST. JOSEPH'S.

The C. Y. M. A. will hold their 4th smoker next Tuesday evening. The committee have secured some very fine talent, and this promises to be more of a success than any of the previous smokers held by the C. Y. M. A. Refreshments will be served. The Glee Club of the C. Y. M. A. have reorganized for the season with a membership of thirty. A competent director has been secured and the Club intends to give a concert or opera early in the spring. John Hart has been elected President and Harry Domrink, Secretary.

The new west wing which has been added to St. Joseph's Orphan asylum and which has been in process of construction since last spring, will be opened Thanksgiving day with a reception to the patrons of the institution and a donation to enable the Sisters of Notre Dame, who conduct the asylum, to fit up the new quarters. The addition, which cost nearly \$20,000, is four stories in height, with an attic; its ground floor dimensions are 27 by 70 feet.

A laundry equipped with the latest improved machinery will occupy the first floor. In the basement new boilers will furnish steam heat for the entire building. School rooms will occupy the second floor; on the third will be a chapel; the fourth will contain dormitories, and the attic will be used as a place of storage. Oscar Knebel, of the executive board, withdrew the plans of the main structure some 27 years ago and those of the east wing 12 years ago, also prepared the plans for the new west wing. With its new addition St. Joseph's Orphan asylum has a frontage of nearly 150 feet on Andrews street, and is considered one of the best equipped institutions of its kind in the state.

Dr. N. F. Kiefer has been appointed medical examiner for Branch 84, C. M. B. A. He is now examiner for 34, 58, 131.

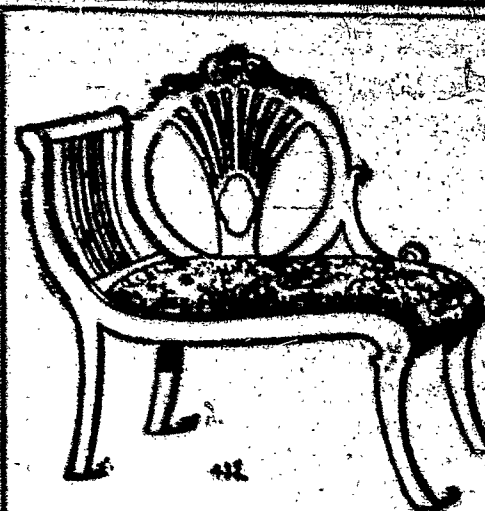

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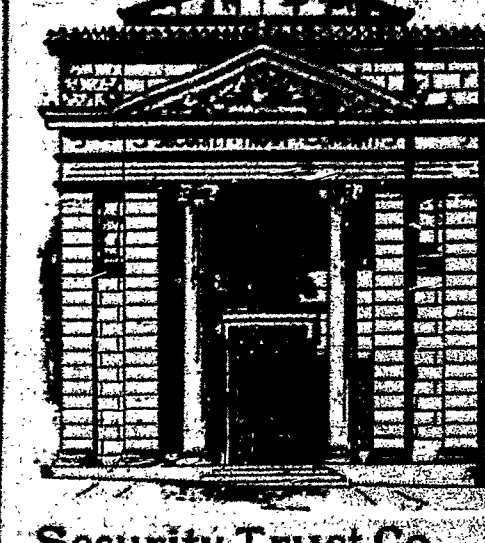
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
