Bad Smells to Warn Ships.

A new system for the prevention of marine accidents proposes, says the Sheffield Telegraph, to place strongly smelling chemicals in floating receptacles to be attached to the existing light buoys and bell buoys. Cliffs and dangerous shoals are very often hidden by thick fog, which does not allow light to penetrate nor sound to be heard until too late, while the strong smell of some chemical substances would be carried far away, and would indicate to the seafarer with a keen olfactory sense at great distance that he is nearing a dangerous coast.

Forbid the Long-distance Rifle.

There have been many fatalities among hunters in the Maine woods lately, but they have not been due altogether to mistakes. It is the longdistance rifle that does the business there, as it has done in Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota and elsewhere. The sportsmen ought to be compelled by law to use a gun that will not kill a man at a distance of a mile or two.

A TABOURET RECEPTACLE.

Upholster the top with curled hair and denim of some desirable color, and ers, and about three inches from the catch it all around the edges with large, oval headed tacks, that may be carry a whip in a perpendicular postdriven through a gimp band to hide the tion or parallel with and on the under raw edges of the material.

The entire outside of the tabouret is to be covered with the denim and held in place with oval headed brass upholsterer's tacks having heads threeeights of an inch in diameter.

Pockets of denim can be made and tacked fast to the inside of each side. and they should be made full enough to receive a pair of shoes nicely. The pattern at the front side and the circles at the lower end of each side are formed with tacks.

The cover is prevented from falling back too far by a chain at one side, the ends of which are attached to the under side of the cover and to an angle are no large streams, many small ones at the side of the receptacle. If painted or 'enamelled wood is preferred to the denim covering; the embellishment can be worked out with the tacks to equally good advantage.
