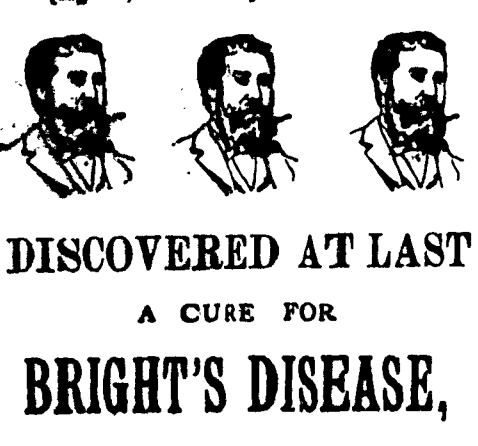

Antidote for Snake Bites.
 United States Consul General, of Zurich, calls the attention of the department to an article appearing in the Weekly Scotchman in regard to the anti-venomous properties of the bile of serpents. Experiments with the bile of the African cobra, the puff adder and the rattlesnake. It was stated at a meeting of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, showed that the bile when mixed with the venom of serpents was able to prevent the fatal doses of the latter from producing death. Although nontoxic in the alimentary canal, the bile salts and pigments acted as poisons when injected under the skin or into a blood vessel. It was impracticable, the article continued, that bile in its natural form could be used as an antidote, except by internal administration or by application to the wound caused by a snake bite. The report has been referred to the United States marine hospital service.
