CONNAUGHT.

GALWAY.

With regret we announce the death of Mrs. Penelope MacHugh, relict of Mr. Tobias MacHugh, builder, Dunmore, and beloved mother of the Rev. Michael J. MacHugh, administrator. The sad event occurred at the residence of her son, Mr. Tobias MacHugh, O'Connell's, on Wednesday, December 22, in the 76th year of her age. The deceased was one of the old stock of Tuam. The interment took place on Christmas eve, at Dunmore cemetery, the family burial ground, attended, notwithstanding the inconvenience of the day, by an immensely large and representative funeral.

The progress made in erecting the new cathedral at Loughrea is satisfactory. Men have been engaged clearing the site of the buildings there for generations, one of these being Monahan's hotel, which Charles Lever immortalized.

The bazaar in aid of the funds of the Sisters of Mercy, Sligo, which has been growing in popularity year after year, was brought to a successful termination a few days ago. The bazaar was opened in presence of a large gathering Wednesday, by an eloquent address from Most Rev. Dr. Clancy, Bishop of Elphin.

The death of James McGarrick, merchant, Coolaney, occurred last week, at the age of 47 years. Masses were offered up for the eternal repose of his soul by the neighboring clergy on Thursday, and on Thursday at 12 o'clock the funeral started for Killoran graveyard, and the many friends and acquaintances of the deceased in Coolaney and surrounding parishes joined in long procession.

The meeting of the Soey branch of the I. N. F. was held on Sunday, Mr. E. Clerkin, president, in the chair. The meeting proved most important, as the large numbers present, and the great National enthusiasm displayed, fully repeated the stirring times of the Land League movement in Soey.

'98 was inaugurated in Sligo by a torchlight procession parading the principal streets, headed by the Emmett brass band and the mayor, Mr. E. A. McHugh, M. P.; Mr. T. Flanagan, T. C.; Mr. E. Foley, T. C.; and the foremost Nationalist members of the corporation, together with the leading representatives of the different Nationalist sections. The procession halted at the Market Cross, where a flag had been erected, and a most enthusiastic meeting was held, commencing as the cathedral chimed tolled at 8 o'clock. The mayor said the men of Sligo were as true to the cause of Ireland to-day as they were in the days of Emmet and Wolf Tone. It was a most auspicious opening of the year '98 to see such a magnificent assemblage gathered to honor the memory of the heroes who had died for their native land. He was proud and honored to be their mayor for '98, as by their spirit to-night they showed they

were true Irishmen. The people assembled opposite the town hall and sang "God Save Ireland" and "Who Fears to Speak of '98."

The council specially appreciate the action of the fathers who recently conducted a mission in the Church of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Dublin, who delighted the hearts of young and old by having hymns sung and prayers said in the old tongue."

Members who attended a recent meeting of the Gaelic League in Dublin were treated to a most entertaining lecture by Mr. MacNeill on the scenery, people and antiquities of Ireland, illustrated. The views given included the most beautiful in Ireland, Glengariff, the Gap of Dunloe, the Pass of Calmeene, while such places of historical interest as Dungannon, Lough Swilly, Dunluce Castle, Kilkenny, Wexford, Derry and Macroom Castle were given.

New Year's Day was observed with customary solemnity, unusual pomp and magnificence at the Pro-Cathedral, Marlborough street, Dublin. At the celebration of the different masses the sacred edifice was filled to inconvenience. The ceremonies were attended by large numbers of Catholics from every parish in the city, who, as usual on this auspicious day, like to patronize the Pro-Cathedral because of the many associations that link it to the people of Dublin. High mass was celebrated in the presence of an immense congregation, many having to remain standing from want of seating accommodations during the offering up of the Holy Sacrifice. Most Rev. Dr. Walsh, D. D., Archbishop of Dublin, who presided, was assisted at the throne by Very Rev. Canon Flanagan, Baldoye, and Very Rev. Canon Connolly, Donnybrook. The celebrant of the mass was Rev. KING'S.

The Very Rev. Hugh Behan has announced that early in the year steps will be taken to effect alterations and improvements in the Church of the Assumption. The fine old building, which has been the only place of worship for the Catholics of Tullamore for a century was recently examined by architect William Hague, Dublin, who discovered that the ceiling had fallen more than a foot from its original position, and its present state constituted a grave danger. Other serious defects in the building were found and considerable internal alterations are necessary. As a result, Father Behan has intimated his intention to proceed with the work of renovation, and, as no funds have so far been provided, he proposes to establish a weekly collection.

CORK.

The naval Commander-in-Chief at Devonport, England, Hon. Sir E. Fremantle, has officially announced that the Queen has been graciously pleased to award Stoker Edward Lynch the Albert medal of the first class for gallant conduct in rescuing his comrade, Stoker J. Paul. The medal will be presented at an early opportunity with befitting ceremony. This presentation is being made as a result of Lynch's bravery on the occasion of the wreck of the torpedo boat destroyer Thrasher, when he risked his life to save his comrades from a terrible death. Lynch is a native of Youghal.

The friends of the late Mrs. Rogers will learn with deep regret of her death, which took place on the 20th ult. She was the wife of John Rogers, the fishery instructor at the Ballinmore school. She earned the respect of all who knew her, including the late Most Rev. Dr. Fitzgerald, Bishop of Ross.

By permission of Rev. M. J. Sheehy, P. P., the manager, the children of Beengaroga National school, Baltimore, were entertained at a Christmas tree fete, got up by Misses McCarthy Morrogh of Linnabeg, assisted by Miss Maxwell of Kellena and the teacher, Mrs. Moloney.

"Who Fears to Speak of '98"—The bells of the city churches in Cork had just begun to chime in the new year of 1898 simultaneously with the assemblage of the populace to do honor to the memory of the men who participated in the movement of 1798. By 11.30 the city bands and contingents had taken their places, and before the procession started from the court house the spectacle was a brilliant one. For barrels and torches burned abundantly in hands on the roadway, while the sidewalks were packed with people. At 12 o'clock the great cavalcade started, many bands playing appropriate airs. The line of route was Patrick's street, Merchants' Quay, Parnell place, South Mall and Grand Parade, where they dispersed. The scene en route was a most brilliant one. As the demonstration passed the Examiner office, in front of which burned a gas device bearing the motto "Remember '98," great enthusiasm was manifested. The procession was led by an open float, drawn by four horses, on which were placed four tar barrels. Then followed the Fair Lane rifle and drum band, carrying a transparency bearing the mottoes, "Remember '98," "Who Fears to Speak of '98?" "In Memory of Those Who

Fought and Died," and "Remember '98." Next, bearing in their ranks a large stock of torches, were the bands of the Butcher exchange, Barrack street and the Workmen's. The following national and trades bodies took part: Redmond hurling club, St. Finbarr's hurling club, Nils football club, O'Brien's football club, Drapers' football club, Lee football club, Grocers and Wine Merchants' association club, coopers, carpenters, tailors, masons, plasterers (two branches), laborers, coal porters, bootmakers and riveters, painters, stonecutters, coach builders, Hackney Carriage association, brewery workers, molders and bakers. An auspicious feature was the absence of the police. The entire organization and working of the demonstration fell on John O'Sullivan, Simon Potter, Daniel O'Leary and William O'Shea, who received most valuable assistance from the individual members of the Bryan Dillon club. Passing through Parnell place the bands ceased playing in respect to the memory of Mr. J. L. Bogan, for many years a Unionist member of the corporation. On returning to the corner of Great George's street, via the southern end of the Grand Parade, the people dispersed.

The centenary of memorable '98 was haralded in Tipperary in a manner that proved the deeds of the brave men who shed their blood for Ireland a century ago are not forgotten. The Nationalists united as one to usher in the year that saw such heroic valor displayed and to do honor to the memory of the dead. At 10:30 the town presented a scene of the greatest brilliancy, every house being illuminated. Tipperary brass band and the William

O'Brien fife and drum band turned out and proceeded to the Foresters' hall. By the time the Foresters' hall was reached 5,000 persons had assembled, and then the vast gathering marched to the top of O'Brien street, where tar barrels were ablaze, and preceded by the National flag of the town, and an illuminated catafalque, having on either side the inscription, "Remember '98," with crossed pikes. Behind came the bands playing "The Boys of Wexford." The enthusiasm and unanimity of the people were inspiring. The procession marched through the town cheering and wended its way to the Hill of Crogue, which overlooks the famous hill of Ballyhurst, where 1,000 Fenians met in '67 with Gen. Bourke at their head. On the peak of the famous hill a large bonfire was lighted. Cheers were given for '98 and '67.

WATERFORD.

As Christmas was approaching there died at Abbeyside, Dungarvan, Mary McGrath, who had reached the remarkable age of 105 years. She was born in Ring and has lived in Abbeyside for a considerable time. Up to her death she possessed all her faculties, but was somewhat feeble. Her funeral took place on Christmas Day. About 12 months ago a man named James Cashin, living within a mile distant, died at the age of 107 years.

The late Most Rev. Dr. Kirby, who was rector of the Irish College in Rome, was a native of Waterford City and lived in the Square.
