Transplanting a Tree.

If you want to move a large tree from one part of the grounds to another or from the woods, dig a circular trench about three or four feet away from the hole, any time after the light freezing has occurred and before very hard weather sets in. Dig deep enough to get under the roots, making the ball smaller at the bottom, then wait until the ball of earth is frozen. Raise with jack screws and load upon a low stone wagon. In the meantime a wide hole six to eight feet in diameter and three deep should be made where the tree is to go, and nearly filled with a good soil. Immediately over it should be put one or two loads of manure to prevent the soil from freezing, so it can readily be used in the replanting. The manure may then be spread upon the lawn.
