FROM ACROSS THE SEA.

London .- In the House of Commons the motion of Mr. Michael Davitt, moved as an amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne, at the reassembling of Parliament, calling attention to the distress in Ireland and the failure of the potato crop, was rejected by a vote of 285 to 169.

London .--- Lord Salisbury, in the House of Lords, said the concessions the government had asked in return for the Chinese loan were, without exception, directed toward increasing and freeing the trade with China and contained nothing injurious to China herself.

London .--- Official advices just received by the Foreign Office from Pekin, are to the effect that Japan has notified China that she intends to keep Wei-Hai-Wei permanently.

Paris .-- M. Zola and his friends, it was feared for a time, might be lynched by an infuriated mob which surrounded them as they left the court room in Paris.

Peking .- The Tsung-Li-Yamen has instructed the Viceroy of Nanking to receive Prince Henry of Prussia upon the latter's arrival at Shanghai.

Madrid.-The Spanish government has decided to send the Spanish cruiser Almirante Oquendo to Havana, and thence to New York.

Pretoria.-Paul Kruger has again been re-elected President of the South African Republic.
