The services consisted of a solemn requiem high mass, the services for the dead, and a sermon by Rev. William Mulheron. The altar. pulpit and pillars of the church were decorated in keeping with the occasion, the sombre black bespeaking the solemnity of the service, mingling with the national colors in honor of the departed dead. A representation of a casket occupied a promnent position in the middle aisle near the altar, and this was draped, as is the custom. representing a body over which the services are being held. Father Mulheron's sermon was brief, but expressed a deep and sincere ympathy for the unfortunate seamen, about one half of whom were Catholics, who met their death in honor of their country.
