Perhaps his noblest act was the thrilling part he took in the rescue of lives from the illiated bark, the Edmund, which in 1850 was wrecked on the Duggena Rocks at Kilkee, when 100 persons were lost. Those who recollect that terrible night say that no words could describe the gallant acts of McCarthy. who was instrumental in saving the lives of many of the passengers. In consequence of the rescue a pathetic story is recounted of how the first person saved by McCarthy was a woman from Kilkee, whose name was Betty Crowleo, and who was going to her friends in America. She was half unconscious when got ashore, in Me-Carthy's arms, and on recovering her first inquiry was, "Where am I?" To which her rescuer cheerily replied: "Faith, you are home again, Betty!" In his 88th year he passed away as peacefully as a little child.
