ST. BRIDGET'S

Mrs. Wm. Carroll died at the family residence Friday last. She was a devout communicant of the Catholic church, to which with her family, she devoted her life. The deceased was a daughter of the late James Buckley, one of the pioneer settlers and merchants of this city. Besides her husband, she is survived by ten children, three boys, Joseph, Charles and Raymond, and seven girls, Mrs. Thomas B. O'Neil, wife of the ex-consul to Stockholm; Mrs. Morrough Shannon, New Brunswick, N. J.; Mrs. James Coleman, of Buffalo; Madames Katherine and Martha of the Order of the Sacred Heart, and Margaret and Laurine of this city. The funeral took place from St. Bridget's church Monday morning. The church was thronged with friends of the deceased lady. Solemn high requiem mass celebrated by the Rev. Thomas A. Hendrick, pastor of the church, with the Rev. John J. Bresnahan, assistant pastor, as deacon, and the Rev. Matthias Hargather, pastor of St. Michael's church, as sub-deacon. The mass was sung by a select choir, composed of Mrs. Cecelia Myring Rampe, Mrs. Katherine Mahon, Miss Fannie Moran, William Predmore and Daniel O'Rourke. Miss Clara Connell presided at the organ. Only the relatives and immediate friends of the family accompanied the remains to the grave. The bearers were two sons, Raymond and Charles Carroll; two nephews, Dr. James Buckley and J. Thomas Burns; a son-in-law, Dr. Morrough Shannon, and C. H. Carroll. A first communion class has been organized this week.

The May devotions will take place after 8 o'clock mass each day. A month's mind requiem mass was offered last Wednesday for Mr. James Fahy.

An anniversary requiem will be offered Saturday morning for Sister Mary Aloysia, sister of Father Hendrick.

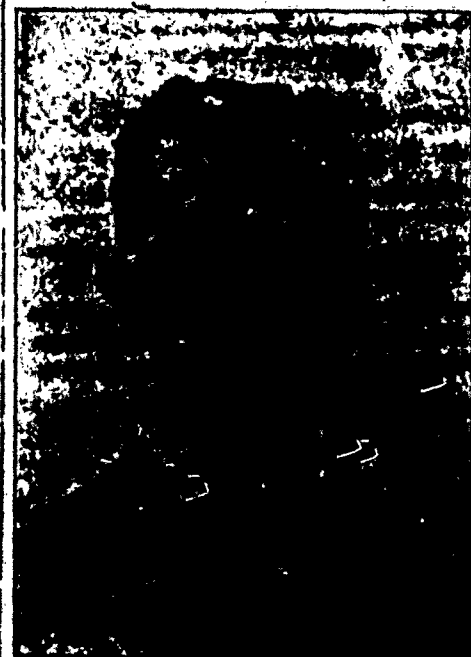
WONDERLAND THEATRE
