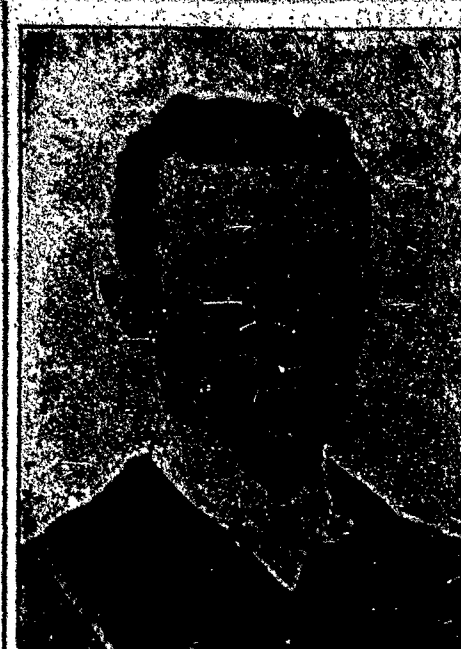
### Ingenious Tableware.
