The framework of a primitive loom was found under a mound of clay and the number of broken needles and bone splinters found in another mound leads to the belief that it was the site of an ancient needle factory. Some think it was a factory for the manufacture of bullets at the time of the siege. It is visited daily by crowds of the cifizens of
