It can be set to temper the light, to keep off dangerous drafts, to shut away a bad wall paper pattern from the tired eyes that weary of following large geometrical patterns, and in many other ways he made useful.

If one lives in a large house in the country, where it is not necessary to economize space by sleeping in the parlor and cooking in the dining-room, there is still use for the screen. When one has drawn a chair up by the hearth with a lamp upon the table at one's side, a tail three-panel screen will shut away the shadows and the windy gusts that steal in thro gh the loose casement. Elderly lad'es and delicate children may be saved many a cold by the screen in the sitting-room. In the dining-room a screen is almost an absolute essential to mask the door leading to the kitchen, or the butler's pantry. The effect of many a beautiful dining-room has been spolled by this vista of cook stove, range or pantry, which a screen would have concealed. In the hall, too, the screen is a most useful article. It can stand sentinel before the door that leads to the back hall, or that which goes down to the cellar. Indeed, there are very few halls so arranged that a screen is not almost as much a necessity as it may be an ornament.
