Home of Industry Now Masons as a Hom for Aged Women Exclusively.

The following circular letter has seen issued by the committee who have been appointed to assist, in the change of the character of Home :"

The undersigned take the liberty to address you in behalf of the institution hitherto known as the "Home of Industry" and inesparably associated with the memory of the saintly Mother Hierosymo, its founder. It was originally intended as a home for working girls, but in course of time it lost this character, and at the death of Mother flieronymo it contained a number of orphan children and aged women, with only a few working girls. It at once became evident that, if the home was to continue its mission as a charitable institution, a change would have to be made. Some of the children were, accordingly, placed in Catholic familles and the remainder transferred to the Catholio erphan asylume, of which there are three in the city of Rochester and several others throughout the diocese. We mention these things to show that no real want filled by the Home is the past will be neglected in the future.

The Sisters in charge have, with the approbation of the Rt. Rev. Bishop, converted the Home into an institution for the care of aged women exclusively. The wisdom which guided the good Sisters in this resowill become evident when we consider that in the whole discuse of Rochester there is no institution devoted to this worthy purpose. For the aged female, left without a home in her declining years, the only al-ternative was to die by the wayside or to go from which our Catholic people, however destitute, shrink with a feeling somewhat akin to horror. This is natural and will easily find an explanation in your Carbolic and a love of them for Christ's sake. Without the latter the former cannot be called charity except by doing violence to the Christian meaning of the term, a violence which medern civilization has long since accomplished. These good Sisters have left the world and consecrated their lives to the charitable work of carring for Christ's poor. The sudden news of the death of Rev. I Pascalar formerly rector of St. Michael's church of this city, was announced by Father Hargather at St. Michael's last Sunday, The ennouncement was like a shock to the con-gregation and many tried hard to suppress

Rev. Fridolin Pascalar was born on May 14, 1841, in Stimpfach, Wurtemberg, Ger-many, where he received his primary education in the parochial achoools. After confirmation he learned the carpenter's trade and worked at that vocation for four years. But his mind was bent on something higher and he joined the order of Jesuits as a layman. Hethowed great talent and soon was induced to study for the priesthood. The Josuits at that time sont him as a lay brother to Bombay, India, where he remained for two years. Becoming sick and unfit for the elimate he returned to Germany, to a town named Maria Lach, in Westphalia, Here he faished his studies and was ordained as this country and was appointed pastor of St. Michael's church, of Rochester, in November, 1873, then just organised. He was the pastor of that church for twanty-two years. He leaves three brothers and two sisters, Bombay, India; John Pascalar, who lives at No. 3 Leopark, Rochester; Alois Pascalar, who slill lives on the old homestead in Stimppach with his sister Johanna Schierle.
