BISHOP McQUAID'S LETTER.

The annual appeal of Bishop McQuaid to the people of the diocese of Rochester in behalf of St. Bernard's Seminary. The people were thanked for their generous support of the institution and were asked to continue their liberality. The needs of the institution were stated. Three students have to be educated at the Propaganda in Rome to prepare them for professorships in St. Andrew's, has also to be kept up. It was stated that the larger seminary was crowded to its utmost capacity, half of the students coming from other dioceses. These students are, of course, paid for by their bishops or themselves.

The great need of the Seminary was stated to be a new library building, an assembly hall capable of seating 500 persons, larger class rooms and rooms for the accommodation of a hundred additional professors and students. There is now \$5,000 in the treasury for the new building. The letter divulged the name of the priest who several years ago gave \$10,000 to the Seminary. It was Rev. Angelo Lugero, who was recently given a leave of absence in order to return to Italy in search of health.

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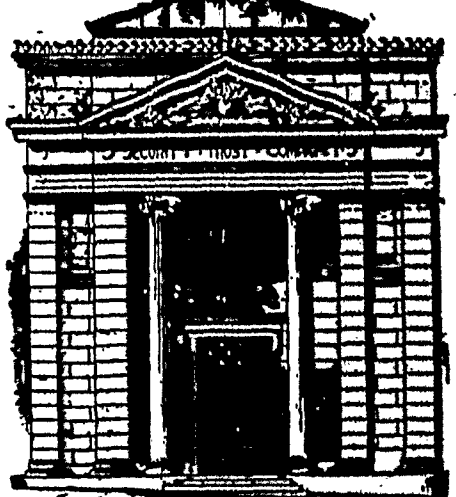
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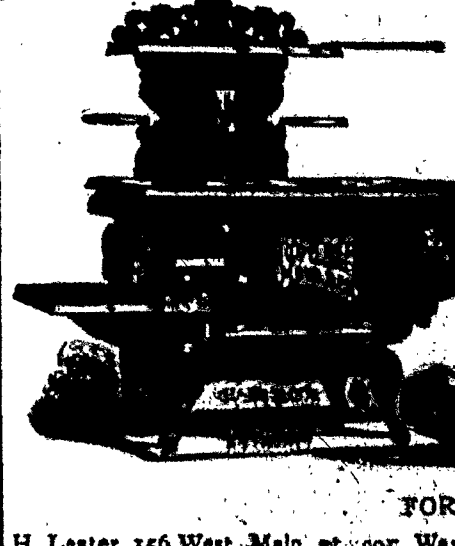
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
