DEATH OF HUGH HACKETT.

Hugh Hackett, an old resident of Rochester, who for many years conducted a Catholic bookstore on the corner of Brown and Frank streets, opposite the Cathedral Parochial school, and in addition sold books and religious articles of various kinds throughout the diocese of Rochester and Western New York and acted as agent for the CATHOLIC JOURNAL, died Saturday morning at his home, No. 78 Jones street, aged 73 years.

Mr. Hackett was born in Ireland and came to this country when young. He had been a resident of Rochester for over fifty years and during all that time had dealt in books. He was known in every town and village in western New York, and wherever known was highly respected.

Deceased was prominent in the Cathedral and was a member of the St. Vincent De Paul and the Knights of St. Patrick's Societies. Mr. Hackett continued in active business until a year ago, when he fell out of a window, injuring his spine. For three weeks he was in bed at St. Mary's Hospital, and the doctors feared he would die then. He never fully recovered from the shock received from his fall, and he slowly declined in health.

Mr. Hackett leaves a widow, two daughters, Mrs. Katherine Smith and Alecia Hackett, and three sons, Michael, John and Hugh, Jr. The funeral was held Tuesday morning at 8:30 o'clock from the house and at 9 o'clock from the Cathedral.
