THE ALUM BAKING POWDERS.

Names of Some of the Principal Brands Sold in This Vicinity.

The recent discussion in the papers of the effect upon the human system of food made with alum baking powders and the opinions that have been published from noted scientists to the effect that such powders render the food unwholesome, have caused numerous inquiries for the names of the various alum powders.

In Ohio, New Jersey, Massachusetts and other States, of such importance do the food authorities deem the matter, that the names of alum powders are officially made public, and in two States, at least, the laws provide that there shall be printed upon the labels of all packages of this class of powders the statement that they contain alum.

Information as to the list here given has been obtained from the reports of Dr. Collier, official chemist of the New York Agricultural Experiment Station at Geneva, from the reports of the New Jersey Food Commission, the Agricultural Department chemist at Washington, and from other reliable authority:

In addition to these, it is learned that many grocers are selling what they call their own private or special brands. These powders are put up for the grocer, and his name put upon the labels by manufacturers of alum powders in Buffalo, Philadelphia, Cincinnati and elsewhere. The manufacturers, it is said, find their efforts to market their goods in this way greatly aided by the ambition of the grocer to sell a powder with his own name upon the label especially as he can make an abnormal profit upon it. Many grocers, doubtless, do not know that the powders they are thus pushing contain alum and would be actually contraband in many sections if sold without disguise.

It is quite impossible to give the names of all the alum baking powders in the market. They are constantly appearing in all sorts of disguises, under all kinds of cognomens, and at all kinds of prices, even as low as five and ten cents a pound. They can be avoided, however, by the housekeeper who will bear in mind that all baking powders sold at twenty-five cents or less per pound are liable to contain alum, as pure cream of tartar powders cannot be produced at anything like this price.

SUPREME COUNCIL C. M. E. A. WINS A SUIT.

Justice Nash presiding in the Trial Term of the Supreme Court Thursday directed a verdict for the defendant in the action brought by Mary A. Keefe against the Supreme Council of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association. The case for the plaintiff had all been presented when the court made the ruling. Hon. James M. E. O'Grady appeared for the plaintiff and John J. Hynes for the defendant.

Mrs. Keefe brought the action to recover \$2,000 on a policy of life insurance in which she was named as the beneficiary. On a former trial of the case she was awarded a verdict of the full amount.
