Dr. Comerford, bishop of Kildare and Leighlin, took place Sunday, Oct. 15, in the presence of a congregation. In connection with the function was observed by most of those present the removal from the position which it had occupied for half a century, of Hogan's statue of the immortal J K L to one between the two great pillars of the northern transept on the opposite side of the church, where the genius of the sculptor can be apreciated to the utmost and where his exquisite concertion of the world-famous churchman in his episcopal robes, with outstretched arm appealing to heaven and earth for Mother Erin kneeling at bis side, can receive its full meed of admiration. The pulpit is remarkable for the rare beauty of its workmanship. It is erected at the first of the pillars which separates the southern transent from the nave, and from base to sounding board is 20 feet in height. The material is rose cushion oak of finest color and quality. At the base stands the figure of St. Victor, mentioned by St Patrick in his Confessions, and at either side those of St. Lazarian. Bishop of Old Leighlin, and St Conlei'h. Bishop of Kildare. Patrons of the United Diocese St. Victor bears errolled letter with the words "Vox Hibernorum." St. Conleith, clad in the ample vestments of the Middle Ages, in giving Pontifical Benediction. and St. Lazarian, clad in cope and with arm uplifted, is pointing upwards. The pulpit proper is supported upon a deep coring over the heads of the three figures. The mouldings are copied from some beautiful examples on the oak rood screens of the fifteenth century.
