CORK.
The death of Rev. Mother M. Charles,
of Loretto Convent, Fermoy, happened
November 8. She was daughter of the
late B. Ellis, Marlaville, Maynooth,
County Kildare, and niece to the cele-
brated Surgeon Ellis, of the National
College. Miss Ellis entered Loretto
Abbey, Rathfriland, in 1852, during
the life of the venerated foundress,
Rev. Mother Teresa Ball. She was sent
to Fermoy a few months after that
Convent was founded, in 1853.

Rev. T. Murphy, Flint, Michigan, has
given an amount of twenty-five dollars
to Patriots' Memorial Fund, of Bandon,
Cork.

A bad place is Cork City in which to
flaunt the British flag. On Nov. 6 a
banquet organized by the Scotch resi-
dents in Cork, was given to a squadron
of the Royal Scots Greys. When the
men were returning to barracks a
number of young men, including street
preachers, preceded them with a Union
Jack. At Bridge street a rush was
made for the flag by some citizens.

The bearers of the flag dropped it, and
sought shelter in an electric tram.
They were pulled out, and in a mo-
ment there was a scene of great ex-
citement. A search was made for the
individual who tamely waved the
Union Jack, which was eventually
captured, torn up and flung into the
river.

A great demonstration was held in
Mounseabbey on Nov. 12, to take mea-
sures for the founding of an active
branch of the United Irish League.
Mr. Thomas was moved to the chair,
and Mr. Daniel O'Keefe was appointed
secretary.

Nov. 12 a demonstration in sympathy
with the Boers was held in Cork. It
took the form of an extremely repre-
sentative and large meeting in the
Corn Exchange, a substantial plat-
form was erected, over which floated
the Boer flag. The various speakers
were followed with considerable en-
thusiasm by the assemblage. Miss
Maud Gonne arrived in the city at 11-
25 o'clock for the purpose of attending
the meeting, and was met at the sta-
tion by a large crowd and bands of
music. On alighting from the train she
was greeted with loud cheers,
which were repeated as she proceeded
to her carriage. The horses were then
unyoked, and the vehicle was drawn to
the Victoria Hotel, preceded by the
bands, where the scenes of enthusiasm
were renewed. At the meeting there
was no interference with the proceed-
ings, but a head constable and some
constables occupied a position near the
platform. The Mayor (Mr. E. Crean,
M. P.) presided. It was a magnificent
demonstration of sympathy with the
Boers.
