Here wies are sealed to hushands, not alone for this earth, but for the whole countless years of eternity. Here the young Mormon learns the secrets of his faith, the doctrines for which the world is not yet prepared and which are not to be stated to the unbeliever. Here, also, is the meeting place of the priesthood of the murch, the sacred hall where the leaders are supposed to gain their revelations direct from God and transmit than to the teachers of the people.

Thick velvet carpets, like those of the palaces of the Orient, cover the floors. Divans are scattered about over the floors. and covered with the richest of fabrics. Heavy hangings of almost priceless material are draped from the high ceiling to the floor, sweeping down to shut out the light of the windows, Great Greek columns arise from the floor almost to the celling, forty feet above, and some are surmounted with the busts of the presidents of the Church the men who in the schemes of Mormon salvation are to take their places among the gods and to be rulers of earthe created for them and their descendants. 
