THIS WINTER'S FROCKS ARE OF THE SIMPLEST MAKE-

and Skirt Suits for School-Nev nat Party Gowns-Nevoltice in Linguise-New Fashion of Wearing Garters-Simple Way to Make Underwear Decallete.

Go much attention is being paid now n children's clothes that the dressmakers find it quite profitable to dewete a great part of their time to plansing out costumes for young girls. The day is past when it was considered accessary for a girl simply to have any sert of gown for any sort of occasion. md made-over clothes were given to girls of fifteen and sixteen without the slightest regard as to whether the material, coloring or style were suitable. The freshness of youth generally can stand a good deal in the way of unbecoming clothes, but the improvement in the appearance of the young girls of to-day is so great that it is devoutly to be hoped the old ideas never will provail again. Simplicity is the keynote for the frocks of all children,



from babyhood until they put on their coming-out frocks. It is not at all woolen frocks, with the old-fashioned le never a waistband, the idea being to icave everything around the waist as free as possible. (This, however, does agure as the child grows older.) The Mittle frocks are finished with a hem and two or three tucks. The sleeves with two or three rows of smocking eround the wrist. The colors should Do pale blue, pale pink or red, the latthe least preferable. Soft cashmere or French flannel are the best materiale.

# For Afternoon and Party Wear.

For afternoon and party wear frocks of fine lawn and cambrics trimmed with lace or hand embroidery are still fashionable. They should be made either with guimpes or with guimpe effect, and as much lace as is desired. Hirls of ten and older are wearing this winter dotted Swiss muslins a great **Seal.** Small children have their frocks gathered on to the band, but the front breadth and side seams must be gored, ar the skirt does not hang well. After a girl is eight years old she should wear a gored skirt, unless she be abmormally slight. This rule applies to all materials. The bardest age to dress a girl becomingly is between ten and eighteen, for girls are either tall and lanky or short and fat, and it requires a great deal of care to have siothes that look well made for them. Fortunately, all the large department shops now turn out capital walking suits in skirts and coats that in some bustances are cheap, extremely well made and in the latest fashion. This autumn and winter the prettlest have been in the double-faced materials, made with gored skirts, finished with several rows of machine stitching, and Eght-fitting, double-breasted reefer fackets. The double-faced cloths are warm and clinging, and when worm with furs are quite heavy enough to do duty all winter. The prettiest are in gray and brown—the blues are not good, but there are some heavy chevlet gowns in that color that are attraceive. They are made in this same style—a little more elaborately because they are trimmed with braid. These suite are particularly good for wear with the flannel shirt waist, which is the best thing that a girl can have for school.

A charming froc- that is suitable for afternoon or church wear is made of a light tan cloth, the skirt gored, with a box plait in the back, and trimmed with two rows of dark brown velvet ribbon. The sides are crossed one over the other in surptice offect, the side that fastens being finished with three satin rosettes and gilt huttons.

The Material

Bengaline or poplin-in effect they resemble each other closely-are greatly in favor for dancing school frocks. These gowns are made up with plain skirts or with overskirts whose only trimming is a narrow ruching of chiffon or ribbon outlining the points. The waist has a yoke and sieeves of lace over white satin. It is arranged to fall in a double box plait just below the waist line, but is almost covered by a pointed lace collar, finished with a little parrow ruching of chiffon that is draped on like a bertha below the yoke. A white chiffon sash, with the ends trimmed with chiffon nuchings, is tied at the left side and makes the skirt look much softer. Pale gray, pale pink, or a light shade of blue are all considered good colors; and there is one shade of heliotropethe pinkish heliotrope—that may be included, although it is a color that is thought to be much more appropriate for women. When used for young girls light gray looks much better if unrelieved by any color save white. Simplicity Rules.

Simplicity still rules in party frocks for young girls, and pure white is thought to be the best color. One attractive model is made of point d'esprit, the skirt gored, with a seam down the front breadth and the material laid in small tucks so arranged that they meet in points at the back and the front. There are two bias flounces edged with white satin ribbon, the waist, is made with tucked yoke and sleeves, the tucks there also forming points, and the body of the waist is full and trimmed with a bertha of the net edged with satin ribbon. A sash of white satin ribbon or of the net trimmed with eatin ribbon is also included. With this frock it is necessary to have two underskirts or petticoats—one made of the same net as the frock, trimmed with a narrow ruffle edged with lace, and the under one of tarleton or lawn, also trimmed with a ruffle edged with lace. Both petticoats, as well as the skirt of the frock, require to be well fitted and bung so that they will flare around the foot and yet will have not an inch of unnecessary fullness across the front or over the hips.
