Mr. David O'Callaghan, Oatquarter National School, Aran, in recent communication said: "I received thirteen scopies of Second Irish Book. We have a class of seventy learning Irish on Sundays. All these are fluent speakers of Irish, and have little English, Andeed, in many cases. English can mever be taught in Aran except through Irish. Yet they are the most Intelligent children I have ever met when taught rationally. An Irishspeaking teacher is absolutely necessary to instruct such children as they ought to be instructed, and yet such is very far from being the case. To my mind the only way for a real revival of our native tongue and extending it through the length and breadth of Treland is the bringing of pupils from districts like Aran, who have passed three years in Irish, and getting them to teach first year Irish classes in large schools in towns and cities. In this way any intelligent teacher should be at to obtain a certificate in six months. This, too, would pay large schools very well, for, take a school of fifty pupils In 5th and 6th classes, and many have much more, that would be £25, for there would hardly ever be a failure in #rst year's Irish now since the grammar has been confined to those books. some schools would have 80 to 100 in those classes—see what results they would earn, besides fitting out their eacher with correct pronunciation and adiom, which he could never obtain **#rom** books."
