His brother was for many years parish priest and vicargeneral of the parish of St. Peter's, Athlone, and it was through his exertions and influence that the splendid Church of St. Peter's was built. Mr. William Kilroe was educated in Maynooth but he had no taste for a profession and settled down on the farm. In 1876 he became a prominent member of the Ballinasloe Tenants' Defense Association. Mr. Kilroe was always a member of the Executive till he merged in the Land League in 1880. He attended all the meetings in Ballinasloe and the country round, speaking most eloquently at all of them. more ardent or unselfish patriot it would be hard to find than Mr. William Kilroe. The programme of the Ballinasioe Tenants' Defense Association consisted chiefly in the three F's-Fixity of Tenure, Fair Rent and Free Sale-but, though Mr. Kilroe fought ardently for these consessions to the tenant farmers when they were got by Lord Mayor presiding. the Land Acts, 1870 and 1881, they brought him no relief, for he was the holder of a lease which brought him to a rackrent till the time of his death.
