CATHEDRAL.

Last Sunday, the feast of the Annunciation, was also the anniversary of the ordination to the priesthood of our reverend rector. He was the celebrant of the solemn high mass, and was assisted by Rev. Mr. Golden as deacon and Rev. Mr. O'Connor as sub-deacon. The Rt. Rev. Bishop occupied the throne, and a very eloquent sermon on the Blessed Virgin was delivered by Rev. Father O'Kane, S. J.

It is estimated that there have been between 1,800 and 2,000 women in attendance at the evening services of the mission that has been in progress during this week. The morning services at 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 o'clock have also been well attended. The 5 and 9 o'clock masses were followed by an instruction, and the Stations of the Cross were read each afternoon at 3 o'clock. The closing services for the women will be on Sunday afternoon, and on Sunday evening at 7.30 o'clock, and continuing throughout the week, the mission will be exclusively for the men. The hours for services will be the same as during the past week. An important part of the mission is the instruction given each evening at 7 o'clock in Lady chapel. This instruction is for all adults who have not, as yet, received the sacrament of Holy Communion or confirmation, as also, for any one desiring of information about the doctrine of the Catholic church. Rev. Father O'Kane is ably assisted in his mission by Rev. Father O'Hara and Rev. Father McCarthy.

The calendar for the month of April will be distributed on Easter Sunday.
