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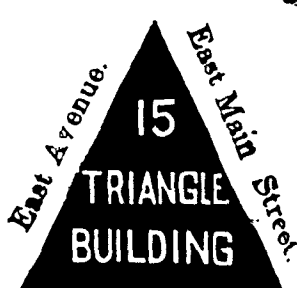

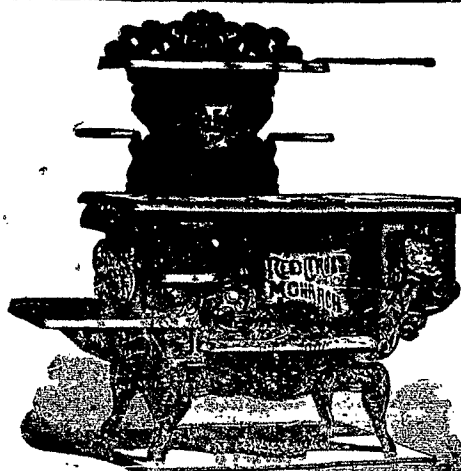

### CATHEDRAL.

Solemn pontifical high mass will be celebrated to-morrow at 10:30 o'clock by our Rt. Rev. Bishop, and papal benediction will be given immediately after mass. Special music has been prepared by the choir under the direction of Prof. Bonn.

A class of 125 men and women were confirmed by our Rt. Rev. Bishop at Lady chapel on last Sunday afternoon. The class was one of the happy results of the mission and was in charge of Rev. Father O'Hara, S. J., for two weeks. During that time many of the members were baptized and received their first communion. The services for the men on last Sunday evening, brought to a close a mission that had been wonderfully successful. During the two weeks there were 5,615 confessions.
