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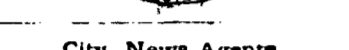

BEATIFICATION.

On May 27th at Rome the Sovereign Pontiff solemnly pronounced the beatification of seventy-seven missionaries martyred in China and Annam between the years 1798 and 1856. They mostly belonged to the French missions.

St. Peter's was brilliantly decorated, and illuminated and the 50,000 persons who assisted in the impressive ceremonies were mostly French people, although many pilgrimages made up of Germans, Spanish, Portuguese, Sardinians, and Egyptians were in the congregation, besides numerous Americans. The Pope, borne aloft in the gestatory chair, entered the church at 6 o'clock amid the dazzling pomp of the papal escort, while a band of trumpeters playing the pontifical march opened the gorgeous pageant. The Sacred College of Cardinals, the entire Vatican court, including the Papal troops and the gendarmes of the guard, followed. The brilliant sight brought forth frantic cheers. Answers to Last Week's Puzzles.

1. It signifies innocence, which should be like a vestment for the priest, and should cast a brightness upon all his life, just as the whiteness of the alb brightens his whole body which it entirely envelopes. 2. It is a cincture, or cord, which holds the Alb around the waist. It represents modesty and good morals. 3. It is the maniple, which simple clerics are not allowed to wear. 4. It is a little vestment of silk, which the ministers of the altar wear upon the left arm, during the holy sacrifice of the mass. In olden times it was used as a handkerchief. 5. It is the tunic, which was formerly a rather long gown or robe; at present it is shorter, and since they have done away with the sleeves, it has become a sort of cloak. 6. Yes, it is the humeral veil, or silver veil of the color of the day, which he places over his shoulders when he is to carry the chalice to the altar or to hold the paten after the offertory, during solemn high mass. 8. It is a vestment in the form of a long band, which the deacon puts on as a scarf passing from his left shoulder under his right arm. 9. The church has made it a symbol or image of the garment of immortality, which was restored to us in baptism. 10. Formerly it was a robe, somewhat like the tunic as we now have it; now a days their is no difference whatever between the two, though each retains its own name.
