### Excursion to the Thousand Islands.

REV. TIMOTHY C. MURPHY NAMED Succeeds the Late Father Kiernan as Rector of St. Mary's.

A concursus was held Thursday, to determine the fitness of candidates for the post of irremovable rector of St. Mary's church. After the examination was concluded, Rt. Rev. Bishop McQuaid officially announced the appointment of the Rev. Timothy C. Murphy to the place.

Rev. Father Murphy is eminently fitted for the place. He was a classmate of the late Father Kiernan, and the esteem in which he was held by

Father Kiernan can be inferred from the fact that he made Father Murphy his executor. He has had eighteen years' experience in the ministry, and throughout has shown an executive ability second to none in the diocese of Rochester. By his sound judgment and energetic work he transformed the section of the city at the western terminus of Lyell avenue into the thriving and beautiful neighborhood that now exists there.

The Church of the Holy Apostles, one of the finest in the city, is another lasting monument of his zeal and judgment. He will be welcomed by all to the fine post to which his ability and virtue have advanced him.
