Clement Scott, in writing of Canton, cays that in 1893 there was a cloud in the Chinese sky, "no bigger than a man's hand," that showed clearly enough what John Chinaman thought of the "foreign devil." To-day, in 1900, Li Hung Chang has left Canton, and Shanghai is threatened.
