Official Call for the C. B. & B. A. Convention at Buffalo, Sept. 11th.

OFFICE OF SUPREME PRESIDENT, ACBURN, N. Y., July 30, 1900.

To the Officers, Delegates and Members of the Catholic Relief and Beneficiary Association: GREETING:—The seventh convention of the Supreme Council of the Catholic Relief and Beneficiary Association...

The Committee on Laws will meet on Sept. 9, 1900, at 2 p. m., at a place to be hereafter designated, to pass upon proposed amendments to the constitution.

SALARIES OF RULERS

The President of Mexico draws \$50,000 a year, the same as President McKinley. The President of France is paid \$240,000 a year. Her Majesty the Queen's income is about \$220 an hour. The Czar of Russia draws a salary of \$12,000,000 a year. The Emperor of Germany receives \$3,852,380 per annum. Two million dollars a year is the annual income of the King of Spain. Abdul Hamid II, the Sultan of Turkey has an income of \$650 an hour. Two hundred thousand dollars a year, or over 500 a day, is the salary of the King of Greece. Three hundred thousand dollars a year is the salary of the King of the Belgians. The combined salaries of European rulers amount to the sum of nearly \$30,000,000 a year. The Emperor of Austria is paid \$12,000 a day for governing a kingdom containing 41,000,000 subjects.

USEFUL HINTS.

In preserving time it is well to remember that large fruit will keep best in shallow stone pots. Molasses will remove grass stains from woollens. Rub in and rinse in clear water. To remove ink stains soak in ripe tomato juice. Tie a piece of bread about twice the size of an egg in a linen bag and put in the pot of boiling vegetables. This will absorb all disagreeable odors and prevent them from permeating the rooms. A little vinegar put into a frying-pan and heated over the fire removes the

Curious Facts

There are 41 cities and 933 towns in the State of New York, only two of the cities having more than 250,000 population. The area of China is 1,534,933 square miles—considerably more than the combined areas of France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy, Austria, Spain, Japan, Norway and Sweden. Some one hundred and fifty colors are now obtained from coal tar, and these have almost entirely supplanted vegetable and animal dyes. In fact, only two of the vegetable class indigo and logwood are still of any considerable importance. Coal yields a large amount of coloring matter the magenta obtained from a ton being sufficient to dye 500 yards of bannel, the surine, 120 yards, the vermillion scarlet, 560 yards and the algairene, 255 yards. The natives of Gomeria, one of the Canary Isles, converse with one another by whistling on their fingers. It is possible to understand a message a mile off. Each syllable of a word has its own peculiar sound. Gomeria is cut up by a number of deep gorges which are not bridged over, and as it would otherwise be impossible for the inhabitants on separate sides of the gorges to talk with one another without going a long way round to meet, they have hit upon the whistling device as the best means of communication.

Curious Facts

More than 3,500,000 Africans were taken from their country as slaves between 1702 and 1807. Ginseng is parsnip-shaped, and when freshly dug is of a white, creamy color. The root is bitter to the taste, but not unpleasant, and is highly valued in China for its supposed medical properties in combating fatigue and old age. In fact in that country it can only be gathered by permission of the ruler. The total amount of money coined by all of Britons predecessors on the throne was \$1,025,000,000. During the present reign the Mint has turned out \$2,250,000,000. There are 20,000 different kinds of butterflies. The average watch is composed of 175 different pieces. In County Donegal, Ireland the market price for knitting a pair of socks used to be one penny, and women worked cheerfully for that sum. Artificial silks are made of wood fibre dissolved to a glue like consistency by acids forced through holes in glass and drawn out into threads. One million eight hundred and fifty thousand square yards of looking-glass is manufactured in Europe annually. On some of the Japanese railways terra-cotta sleepers are used. They are far more durable than those of wood.
