In the neighborhood of Athlone many historical relics of the siege have been found—canon balls, bullets. sewords, gold coins, and gold and silever ornaments. When excavating in n business establishment in Church street, Athlone, July 19, about six feet Thelow the street surface was found a chain shot, used by the Irish army runder-Col. Grace and St. Ruth. All the cannon balls found around here are ten inches in diameter and were used by the heavy guns of the Williamite army. But the present find is a sample of the balls used by the Irish and may have been made in France. It is six inches in diameter, weighs five pounds, with holes all round the circumference where short spikes were fixed. Two balls were connected by a chain eighteen inches long. Those who have been at the Crimean war saw similar balls used by the Russians. The marks where the chain was fastened can be distinctly seen. also the holes where the spikes were fixed. Church street of to-day was the theatre of the Williamite operations. 'A battery was planted on the old town wall, the north gate entrance to the town being at the head of Church street.
