The seventh convention of the O. R. & B. A. was held this week at Buffalo. Several minor changes were made in the constitution. The attempt to restrict the relief fund to "men and such women wage earners as have dependents relying upon them for support," was defeated and the relief benefit is open to all as heretofore. The number of weeks during which a relief benefit will be paid in case of illness has been changed from ten to twelve, and payable as follows: First two weeks, \$3 a week; \$5 week next eight weeks, and \$2 week last two weeks.

Claims against the Relief Fund for grip can only be presented for three weeks. Experience has shown that of the many claims heretofore made against the fund, many were for grip. Honorary members will hereafter be admitted to the society.

The Bulletin, official notice of assessment, is made a charge on the General Fund of the Supreme Council, instead of by direct assessment as heretofore.

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
