POPE LEO CRITICISED.

Many non-Catholics affect surprise, says the Catholic Transcript, that a Pontiff of Leo's well-known liberality of views should deplore the liberty which makes it possible for anti-Catholic proselytizers to prosecute their traffic under the shadow of the Vatican. Those who are so ready to condemn the unexpected "narrown ss" should not forget that the Pontiff has his own point of view. He takes himself and his office seriously. If he were nothing more than the successor of a long line of spiritual rulers who carved out for themselves an unique empire, it would be difficult. indeed, to reconcile his liberality with his seeming intolerance. But Leo XIII does not view his high office in that light. He claims to be, and believes that he is the earthly representative of the Divine Founder of the Christian religion. It is his duty to watch over the whole flock. That flock, according to the prayer of the Great Shepherd, should be one, believing the same truths, obeying the same laws, holding the same communion, worshiping the same God and the same Christ.


