FIVE MINUTE SERMON.

SHORT INSTRUCTIONS ON THE GOSPEL BY A REVEREND FATHER. Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost.

"For many are called but few are chosen."—Gospel of the Day. The lesson in to-day's Gospel is one that applies with equal force to us all. It is the parable of the marriage feast and signifies that the invited are all the children of Adam.

If we consider the promises of God made to the patriarchs, the predictions of the prophets, the figures of the sacrifices and of the legal ceremonies, and the foreshadowings in the events and in the famous personages of the Hebrew nation, we shall see with what abundance God prepared the nuptial feast of Jesus Christ.

This abundance does not stop here if we consider the doctrines of Jesus Christ, His miracles, His example, His death, His merits, and His sacraments, the preaching of the apostles, the constancy of the martyrs, the prodigies which signified the promulgation of the faith and the constant assistant of the Holy Ghost, we shall comprehend how abundantly God has provided food for our souls.

The man who had not a nuptial garment was the sad image of all those who are indeed in the Church because they have been baptized, but who have not the nuptial garment; that is, who have not justice and sanctifying grace, because they are in a state of mortal sin.

We are to learn three things: first, not to despise divine grace; second, to be sure to have the nuptial garment, which is sanctifying grace; and lastly, that it is not enough to be in the Church and bear the name of Christian in order to be saved.
