**Richard Gardiner.**

Who is nominated to succeed himself as assemblyman, in the third assembly district, needs no introduction to the voters of that district. Born in Rochester 33 years ago, has lived here all his life and in the Second Ward since 1887. He is known to all the residents of the district and to know "Dick" Gardiner is to respect and like him. He is plain, blunt and honest, and always ready to do a good turn. He has a heart, too, for the poor unfortunate who had to ask favors from the city's poor department when he was at its head can testify. They had a kindly word and a helping hand, as well as the supplies the city allows its needy poor. It is no exaggeration to state that Richard Gardiner was one of the best overseers of the poor the city has ever had, and his administration of the department elicited commendation from all the charitable organizations, state as well as local.

In the fall of 1898 he was elected to the assembly where he has handled many bills of much interest to Rochester and vicinity; among the many the handling in the assembly of the appropriation of \$75,000.00 for a new West Avenue lift bridge. He introduced and passed the State side path law, codifying the various sidewalk statutes into one general law. This bill generated for Mr. Gardiner the commendation of the whetman of the state. He also introduced and passed the Monroe County Supervisors law which is conceded to be a great improvement over the order of things that formerly prevailed in the management of the county business. But the most important piece of legislation that Mr. Gardiner had charge of last winter was the bill to compel the state to reimburse the city of Rochester for the cost of a number of canal bridges. This will result in turning many thousands of dollars into the city treasury when the cases are presented to the Court of Claims by the corporation counsel. Several unsuccessful attempts had been made in previous years to pass this bill, but it remained for Mr. Gardiner to get it through. This is in itself a high tribute to the popularity of the assemblyman from the third, with his colleagues. The third district will not fail to return its popular assemblyman to the legislature of 1901.
