RICHARD GARDINER.

A Popular Candidate for Assemblyman in the Third District.

Voters in the third assembly district should see that Richard Gardiner is returned to the assembly for the coming year. He is the right man in the right place. In the fall of 1898 he was elected to the assembly where he has handled many bills of much interest to Rochester and vicinity; among the many, the handling in the assembly of the appropriation of \$75,000.00 for a new West Avenue lift bridge. He introduced and passed the state side path law, codifying the various sidepath statutes into one general law. This bill gained for Mr. Gardiner the commendation of the wheelmen of the state. He also introduced and passed the Monroe county supervisors law which is expected to be a great improvement over the order of things that formerly prevailed in the management of the county business. But the most important piece of legislation that Mr. Gardiner had charge of last winter was the bill to compel the state to reimburse the city of Rochester for the cost of a number of canal bridges. This will result in turning many thousands of dollars into the city treasury when the case was presented to the court of Claims by the corporation counsel. Several unsuccessful attempts had been made in previous years to pass this bill, but it remained for Mr. Gardiner to get it through. This is in itself a high tribute to the popularity of the assemblyman from the third, with his colleagues.

Services Conducted in Chapel of St. Mary's Hospital—Requiem High Mass.

Brophy of St. Monica's church; the Rev. George V. Burns, of the Cathedral; the Rev. D. L. Lannan, of the Holy Family church, and the Rev. J. G. Van Ness, of the Holy Rosary church. Interment was at the Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

SUCCESSFUL CHURCH FAIR.

Half of the Church Debt Wiped Out by Bazaar of Holy Cross at Charlotte.

More than one-half of the debt of the Holy Cross church at Charlotte, was wiped out by the proceeds of the church fair, recently held in Bartholomew pavilion, at Charlotte. The total received was \$1,004.44. The total church debt was \$3,800.

Refreshment department, Mrs. Lamphere, \$371.94; cigars, \$262.76; candy, \$88; ice cream, \$51.30; total, \$720. Single admissions at door, \$34; dancing, \$36; cheese \$12.50; total, \$81.50. Total receipts, \$1,004.44.

Alphonse Collins for Assemblyman the Fourth District.

While living in the city he was wardman of the first ward, and since moving to Gates he has been chosen successively for the last three years Supervisor to represent that town in the county board, and is supervisor now. Mr. Collins happily combines all the Granger elements of the country and business interests of the city requisite for the legislative representative of both. He is a man for whom Democrats, Republicans and Independents can vote with the utmost safety.

John L. Kernan.

John L. Kernan, the Democratic candidate for county clerk, is a resident of the Fifteenth Ward and well known throughout the county. He was born in the town of Clarkson in the year 1848, and removed with his parents to the town of Greece in 1852. In 1870 he removed to Charlotte, where he was engaged in the lumber business.

A number of years ago removed to Rochester, where he has since resided. Mr. Kernan became connected with the firm of G. W. and C. T.
