### FIVE MINUTE SERMON.

#### SHORT INSTRUCTIONS ON THE GOSPEL BY A REVEREND FATHER.

Twenty-fifth Sunday after Pentecost. "When therefore you shall see the abomination of desolation, which was spoken of by Daniel, the prophet, standing in the holy place, he that readeth, let him understand." Gospel of the day.

One object of this gospel was to advise Christ's followers among the Jews to escape the evils that were to come over Jerusalem, and the other was to warn Christians who will be living at the end of the world to be prepared for the great desolation that will precede His second coming...

Christ counsels Christians to flee from the general corruption that will reign supreme with Antichrist, even at the cost of what is most dear to them on this earth, preferring to lose all temporal things, rather than lose their souls and forfeit the imperishable goods of heaven.

He whose heart is controlled by passions which cause him to commit all kinds of sin, who cherishes carnal affections, and is attached to the things of the world, cannot walk as he ought in the way of salvation. On this account Christ said: Woe to those who will not be able to escape the torrent of iniquity that will overflow the earth, especially in the days of Antichrist...

Considering how all the predictions in regard to Jerusalem were most minutely fulfilled, we understand why Jesus Christ said that heaven and earth shall pass away, but that His words shall not pass away. Moreover, let us learn to fear the dreadful punishments of the anger of God, to do penance for our sins, to avoid the occasions of sin, and to prepare ourselves for the day of judgment...

### IN MEMORIAM.

### 100 YEARS.

#### ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION AT THE CONVENT OF THE SACRED HEART.

Local Members Celebrate the Founding of the Order.

Wednesday morning the members of the Order of the Sacred Heart in this city entered upon a three days' celebration of the hundredth anniversary of the founding of the order. The principal day of the celebration, Wednesday, was devoted to gatherings of the alumnae of the institution, a reception and dinner to the priests of the diocese. Thursday and Friday were given over to a celebration and entertainments for the children of the school, the parochial school attached to the convent and the children of the orphan asylums.

The exercises Wednesday morning were begun with the celebration of a solemn high mass in the convent chapel on Prince street. The chapel was beautifully decorated with palms and flowers, and the corridor leading to the chapel was also decorated, as were also the halls and rooms throughout the building. In addition to the members of the order the pupils of the institution and a number of the priests of the diocese the mass was largely attended by alumnae and friends of the institution.

The celebrant of the mass was Very Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, V. G., and he was assisted by Rev. M. J. Nolan as deacon and Rev. A. A. Hughes as subdeacon. Rev. G. Burns officiated as master of ceremonies, and the attendants of the celebrant were students of St. Andrew's Seminary. Sixteen of the students of St. Bernard's Seminary rendered the liturgical parts of the mass. Prof. Eugene Bonn was organist, and the choir, composed of former pupils of the institution, was under the direction of Miss Fannie Moran. The following made up the choir: Miss Caroline Cramer, Misses K. Moran, F. Moran, Mrs. Eugene Dwyer, Mrs. Charles Lane, Miss Jessie Minges, Miss Irene O'Connor, Mrs. J. B. O'Connor, Miss McMannis, Misses Madden, Charles Lane, Augustine Connolly, Thomas Burns.

The Kyrie and Gloria were from Gloriosa's first mass; the Sanctus was from Gounod's mass, and the Credo, Benedictus and Agnus were from Weber's mass in G. During the mass a special gradale, "Benedictus et Admirabilis," composed in honor of the anniversary by Prof. Eugene Bonn, was sung by the students of St. Bernard's Seminary under the direction of John T. Petter.

After the mass luncheon was served to the clergy in the library, and the alumnae and visitors were also served in the refectory. In the afternoon an entertainment was given. This consisted of a play by the pupils of the convent and musical and literary numbers. Mrs. Dowling, the oldest Rochester graduate, with a graceful and affectionate address, presented to the "Madames" a substantial purse concealed in a basket of roses, the gift of the Mater Admirabilis society. Mrs. K. C. Mahon spoke in behalf of the former pupils of the institution, while the present pupils were represented by Miss Juliette Leo. Later in the afternoon benediction was given and a sermon preached by Rev. William O'Brien Pardow, S. J., of New York.

Among the ladies who sat down to luncheon were Mesdames Dowling, Mahon, James Cunningham, Charles Cunningham, William C. Hendrick and others to the number of over one hundred.

The ladies from Buffalo presented to the Sacred Heart ladies a massive silver salad bowl, lined.

In honor of the centenary the Sisters presented each priest with a little remembrance of the occasion in the shape of a small article relating to the service of the altar. They also presented one hundred poor families with an excellent dinner, clothed one hundred poor children and presented one hundred poor people with clothing and eatables.
