CITY PARISH NEWS.

Interesting Subject of Missions: Gathered by Our City Reporters

ST. MICHAEL'S.
The silver anniversary of the Knights of St. Michael, Commandery 40, Knights of St. John, was celebrated by special services Sunday at this church. The sermon was delivered by Rev. Mathias J. Hargather. At the close of the services the ladies of the auxiliary presented the regiment with a handsome silk flag bearing the emblem of the order. The presentation was made by Father Hargather, President J. B. Nickel responding. At 8 o'clock in the afternoon the regiment, officered by Col. H. N. Schlick and staff, marched down Clinton avenue, north, headed by Hebing's Artillery band. Monday evening an exhibition drill was given at Germania hall, after which dancing was enjoyed. On Thursday morning at 8 o'clock requiem high mass was said at the church for the souls of departed members of the society.

While parading with the knights, Sunday, Michael Kitzel, aged 62 years, fell dead at the corner of Andrews street and Clinton avenue. Coroner Killip granted a certificate of death due to apoplexy. Mr. Kitzel lived at 110 Lowell street and is survived by his wife, two sons, three daughters, also two brothers and one sister.

ST. JOSEPH'S.
Next Sunday, at 10.30 o'clock, Rev. F. Engert, a son of this parish, will solemnly celebrate his first mass in this church. The Knights of St. Eustace and the men of the parish will form an escort to the celebrant from the hall to the church.

The Arch-Abbot Boniface Krug of the original Benedictine Monastery at Monte Cassino, Italy, is here on a visit with the Redemptorist Fathers. He is a native of Germany, coming to this country in 1849. He went as a boy to St. Vincent's Abbey, Beatty, Pa., to study, and after ten years entered the order. After some years he became president of St. Vincent's college. He was a long resident and citizen of this country. In 1883 he left for Italy and was made Abbot of Censano, where Pius VI and Pius VII were born. In March, 1897, he was made Arch-Abbot of Monte Cassino. He has been for several months in this country visiting the different houses of his order.

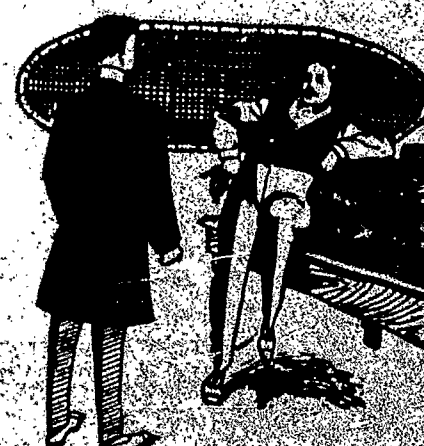
