**The Baker Theatre.**

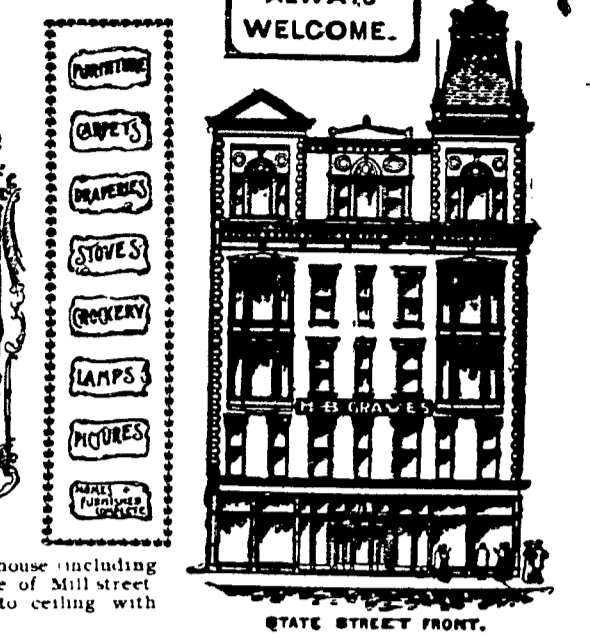
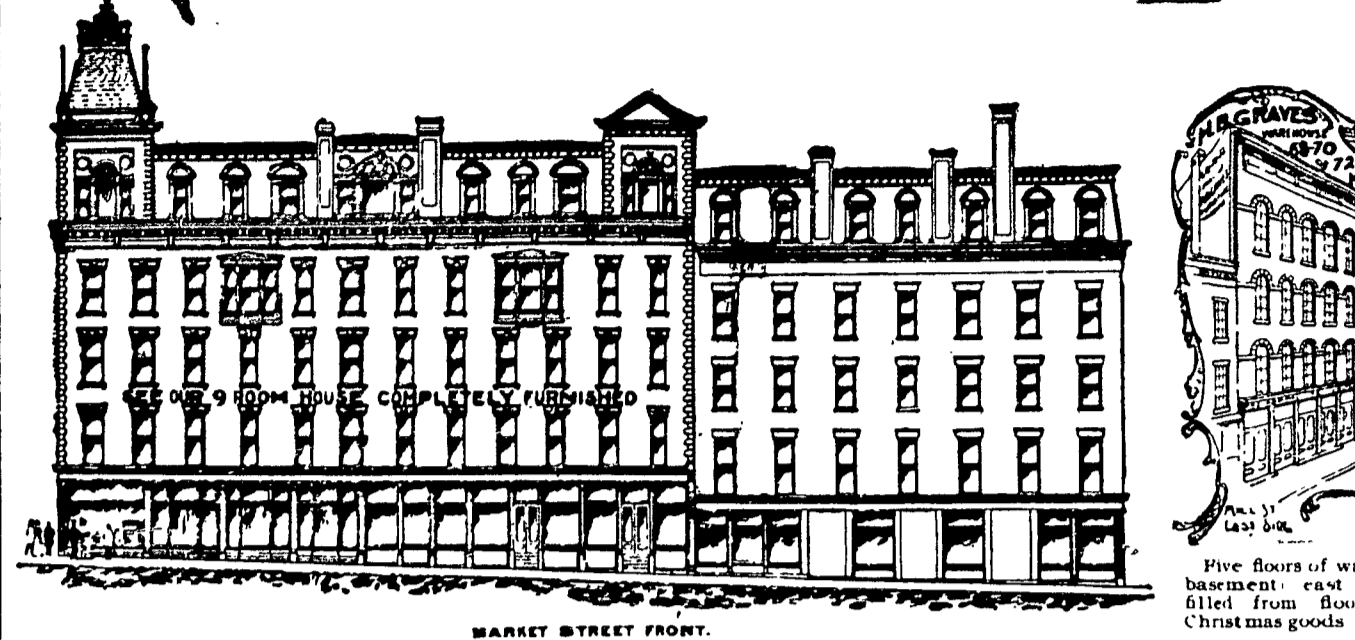
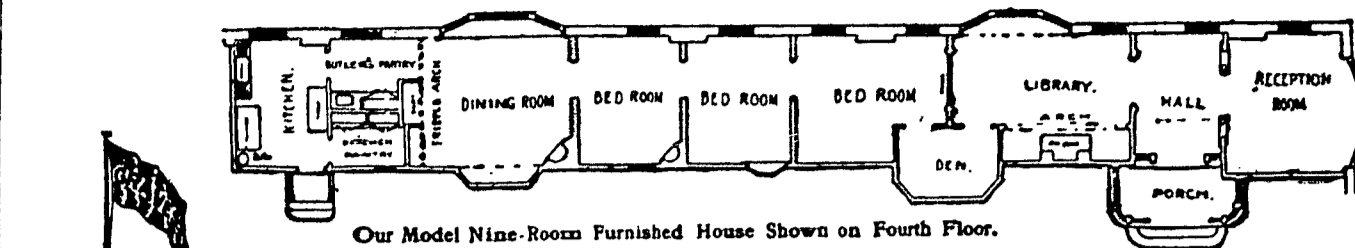
