

OUR IRISH LETTER

NEWS FROM ALL THE COUNTIES OF IRELAND.

What is Being Done by the People at Home—Various Items From Every Section of the Emerald Isle.

CONNAUGHT.

GALWAY.—We deeply regret to announce the untimely demise of Miss J. King O'Donoghue, second daughter of George King O'Donoghue, Esq., of Galway, which occurred after a somewhat protracted illness at her residence, Montpelier Terrace, Galway, on Nov. 21. The deceased young lady was granddaughter of Mrs. Jennings, late of Strawberry Hill, and grand niece of Mrs. Gannon, Ardara, Co. Donegal.

A telegram from South Africa reached Galway a few weeks ago announcing the death of Capt. Nicholas Lynch, only surviving son of Marcus Lynch, Esq., J. P. Barna. He was a young man well known and highly esteemed in Galway, and the sad news of his demise caused deep and widespread regret.

A deplorable accident occurred in Ballinasloe on Nov. 17, resulting in the death of a farmer named John Nevin, of Clontarf, Ballinasloe. The deceased was about to start from Ballinasloe for home, and was in the act of catching the reins of his horse when he fell, and the wheels of his own cart passing over him, the horse galloped away and dragged the man a few yards before it was stopped. Dr. Rutherford, who was passing at the time, immediately had the injured man conveyed to the hospital, but he died on the way. An inquest was held on Nov. 19 by Mr. Pelly, Esq., Coroner, and the medical evidence proved that deceased died from an incised wound on the head, caused by falling against a sharp stone, and a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence was returned.

LEITRIM.—A meeting of the South Leitrim Executive of the United Irish League was held on Nov. 18 for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year. Dr. Mulcahy, J. P., presided.

At a recent meeting of the Ballinasloe Branch of the United Irish League the following order was made: "That, in accordance with the resolution of the Directory of the United Irish League, the tenants on the several estates of this district be asked to wait on their respective landlords or agents and request a substantial reduction in their rents, in consequence of the calamitous condition of the season, and also to know if they are prepared to see to the tenants, and on what terms."

The South Leitrim executive of the United Irish League has contributed £500 to the General Election Fund. This is a remarkable gift, considering that the area of collection is one of the most impoverished in Ireland. It speaks well for the patriotism of the people of this county, and illustrates the popular enthusiasm for the great organization founded by William O'Brien.

The beautiful chapel attached to the convent of the Sisters of Charity, Milltown, Dublin, was the scene recently of a solemn and impressive ceremony—the profession of five young ladies, amongst them Miss Milla Costello (in religion, Sister Mary Malachy, daughter of the late Mr. Patrick Costello, Castlebar. His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin and Father Pettit officiated. Immediately after Mass the young nun made her final vows in the presence of the community and clergy and friends who had been invited to attend the religious ceremony.

It is with great regret we have to announce the decease of Mr. Martin Hughes, Ardce, Claremorris, which sad event took place on Nov. 8, though well advanced in age, he enjoyed excellent health into within a week of his death. He lived on the same farm which his grandfather occupied at the close of the 18th century. During his illness the Very Rev. Archdeacon Kilkenny, D. D., P. P., Killoolman, was unremitting in his spiritual attendance upon him, and in his closing hours he was strengthened and comforted with the consolations dispensed by the Holy Church. The funeral took place on Nov. 10 and the long funeral cortege to the family burying place in the old abbey of Ballinacorney indicated by its representative character the estimation in which Mr. Hughes was held.

ROSCOMMON.—We regret to announce the death of Mrs. Bridget Curran, of Church street, which took place at her residence, Elphin street, Strokestown, on Oct. 20, at the ripe old age of 86 years. The remains were conveyed to Assylin, Boyle, where the interment took place on Oct. 22.

LEINSTER.

CARLOW.—Father Vincent Grogan, who died Nov. 17, at the Passionist retreat in far away Sydney, was well and favorably known throughout the County Carlow, and indeed through the diocese generally being one of its distinguished children. says the Carlow Nationalist. He joined the religious life he was on the Mission for some years as curate in Tullow, and afterwards in Tullyland. He also conducted Missions of the Passionist Fathers from time to time in the Cathedral, Carlow, in Bagnalstown, Portarlington, Rhode, and other parishes of the Diocese of Kildare and Leighlin; and everywhere he won golden opinions by his amiable manner as well as by his solid piety and zeal. His death took place at the comparatively early age of 62 years—at least it was not an age that should have precluded the hope that some might have been yet before him some years of usefulness to his order and to religion. Father Vincent was born at Croghan in the parish of Rhode, and made his ecclesiastical studies in the College of Carlow. He was ordained priest in 1863, and immediately took up missionary work at Tullow, where he labored for some years, being respected and loved by his parishioners. Father Vincent was transferred from Tullow to Tullyland, and soon after he passed from the secular mission to the more austere and rigid life of the Passionists. In his new sphere he soon attracted attention. His talents were less of the brilliant order than of the sound and solid. He was essentially a man of affairs, with a well developed faculty for administration, and a keen sense of the possibilities and exigencies of a situation. These qualities quickly forced him into prominence, and he occupied some of the highest and most responsible positions in the Passionist Order. He was in turn rector, consultant to provincial, and for a term of nine years he held the appointment of provincial. He afterward acted in Australia pro-provincial, and remained there until his death.

DUBLIN.—The funeral of the late lamented Rev. Stephen Egan, C. C., Goldenbridge, took place recently at Monaco, South of France. Father Egan died at Monte Carlo, whither he had gone on the advice of his physician. The morning after his death a Solemn Requiem Mass was celebrated. On the day of the funeral a Requiem Mass was celebrated in the mortuary chapel, the body being present. After the Mass the interment took place, by the kind courtesy of the Bishop of Monaco, in the vault specially reserved for the priests of his own diocese. The celebrant of the Mass was Father Theibert, Vicar of St. Charles' Parish Monaco.

The ceremony of solemnly blessing the new bell of the Star of the Sea Church, Sandymount, took place Nov. 18. The sacred edifice was thronged. The new bell was suspended temporarily near the altar from massive beams covered with green cloth, and the special ceremonial was performed by His Grace the Archbishop at the conclusion of High Mass, at which the celebrant was the Very Rev. Canon Conlan, P. P., St. Michael's.

Despite the unpromising appearance of the weather and the extreme muddy condition of the roads leading to Glasnevin Cemetery a large concourse of people assembled on Nov. 25 in Beresford place in order to take part in the annual procession commemorative of the execution of Messrs. Allen, Larkin and O'Brien. At 1.30 the Old Guard Union, headed by the St. Kevin's Fifé and Drum Band, moved off along Eden quay, O'Connell street, and Cavendish row. At Dorset street the procession was augmented by several bands each of which brought a considerable following, and at Dunphy's corner, the procession consisted of the members of the Old Guard Union, McBride Club, Bray G. A. A., and the Milton and Dundrum Emmet Guards, accompanied by their fine and drum band. At the Cross Guns Bridge a halt was made, the bands ceasing to play lively airs. Then the St. Kevin's Band struck up the "Dead March," and the procession, which had by this time assumed very large proportions, resumed its march to the cemetery. On arriving at the gates, where a large force of police were assembled, a few members of the Old Guard Union, acting as stewards, directed the processionists to the cenotaph of the Manchester Martyrs, Pat O'Donnell, and other memorable memorials of departed prominent Irish revolutionists, whose remains repose in Glasnevin cemetery. The cenotaph erected to the memory of Allen, Larkin, O'Brien and Barrett was literally covered with wreaths and flowers. The other graves decorated were the O'Donnell cenotaph, the Brady plot, wherein are interred the remains of the parents of Joe Brady; the McManus plot, containing the ashes of Col. John O'Mahoney; Sergeant Charles McCarthy, Dan Reddin, T. B. McManus, Ann Devlin, the faithful servant and friend of Robert Emmet; the Brothers Stowell, Ed. Duffy and Major Coburn, Denis Duggan, John "Ammer" Nolan, Patrick Kearney, James Gaffney, Patrick Hickey, John O'Shea, Stephen O'Donoghue (mortally wounded at the attack on Tallait Police Barrack); Terence Byrne, and M. Farrell.

KILDARE.—A venerable and much respected figure in Athy life has passed away in the person of Mrs. Margaret Heydon, Cardenton, Athy, who died Nov. 15 at the age of 82. Mrs. Heydon was a sincere and pious Catholic and a good friend to the poor, whose wants she was ever ready to relieve out of the abundance with which God had blessed her. Her strong religious feeling had its influence in the family circle, and no less than four of her daughters embraced the conventional life. The late Mrs. Minch, Rockfield, was another daughter. On Nov. 7 Office and High Mass took place in St. Michael's church, Athy. The Very Rev. Canon Germaine, P. P., presided, and there was a large attendance of the clergy. When returning to rest on Nov. 20 a portion of her clothing caught fire, and the flames quickly enveloped her. Assistance was promptly rendered, and the flames extinguished, but not until she had sustained injuries to the effects of which she succumbed about noon today. The calamity, so tragic in its awful suddenness, has cast a gloom over the town and district, and the most profound sympathy with Mr. Maguire in his terrible affliction is expressed on all sides.

A woman named Ann Kearney died recently with extreme suddenness at Tullinacanna, Ballynally. She had been complaining of a pain across her chest off and on for some time, but was no worse than usual. The principal business of the meeting was the enrollment of new members. The number admitted being very large speaks well for the future of the branch, which it is anticipated will emulate the most flourishing branches of the League in West Clare. A letter from Major Eustace Jameson, M. P., was read to the meeting, stating that he hoped to be able to visit Clare very soon, when he intends to visit this district in furtherance of the United Irish League.

CORK.—The remains of Miss Frances Flynn, member of a well known Cork family (sister to Mr. J. C. Flynn, M. P.), who was on the pilgrimage to Rome, were laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery of San Lorenzo, just outside the walls of the Eternal City on Nov. 12. The burial service was conducted by Rev. M. J. O'Connor, Pious Society of Missions, and was joined in by Most Rev. Dr. Brown, Bishop of Cloyne; Most Rev. Dr. Kelly, Bishop of Ross; Very Rev. Dean Keller, Cloyne, and Most Rev. O'Leary, Cork. Miss Kathleen Flynn and Mr. Flynn, M. P., were the chief mourners. It may be interesting to know that his Holiness Pope Pius IX., is interred in this cemetery of San Lorenzo. Requiem High Mass for the repose of the soul of deceased was offered in the Church of San Silvestro del Capite, Piazza San Silvestro, on Nov. 14, by the Rev. Father Carmody, Superior F.

Mr. Coroner Rice, Fermoy, held an inquest at Whitegate on Nov. 19 to ascertain the cause of death of a woman named Mary Glavin, a dealer in poultry, whose death on the 15th inst. was reported under suspicious circumstances. Fanny Glavin, daughter of the deceased, deposed that on the night of the above date her mother not having returned home, she went to search for her, and found her near Whitegate with her head suspended from a donkey car on the dyke of the public road. Her legs were in the car and she was then dead. Deceased left home in the morning about half past seven o'clock with some ducks for Carlisle Fort, where she was in the habit of dealing. She was then in good health. She used, however, to get a little weaker and at night was rather nervous. She took about a glass of porter occasionally with no other drink, and each evening generally arrived home about six o'clock. She did witness food in the car the "offal" or waste food, and also some groceries. A purse containing £15, which the deceased took with her from Carlisle Fort, was not at first found, but was afterward discovered by the doctor when making
