ORDINATION AT ST. BERNARD'S.

Bishop McQuaid Raised Six Candidates to the Priesthood.

Bishop McQuaid ordained six students of the diocese of Rochester to the office of sub-deacon at St. Bernard's seminary on Friday morning at 6.30 o'clock. The ordination took place in the chapel of the seminary. The following students were ordained: Peter Erras, George Eckel, Hugh Crowley, Alexander McCabe, James Winters and John Pette.

At the same hour next Saturday the sub-deacons will be ordained deacons. At this ordination several other candidates from outside the diocese will also be ordained deacons. Next June these deacons will be ordained priests. The diocese of Rochester will thus obtain six newly-ordained priests next June, but even this number will not be equal to the need. There is a vacancy at St. Mary's of this city, at Hornellsville, at Ovid, and at Spencerport, besides which assistants are needed in other quarters. The great growth of the diocese of Rochester has always made it impossible to fill all the positions that needed priests.

Rev. Father Angelo, who two years ago resigned his parish and visited Italy for his health, will return soon and will reside at St. Bernard's seminary. He will be chaplain to the Nazareth Normal school on Dewey avenue.

MOTHER AGNES RETURNS HOME.

Rev. Mother Agnes, the superior of Nazareth convent, who has been absent since last October, returned home on Monday. Mother Agnes visited Ireland and England, inspecting their educational institutions in the interest of her school.
