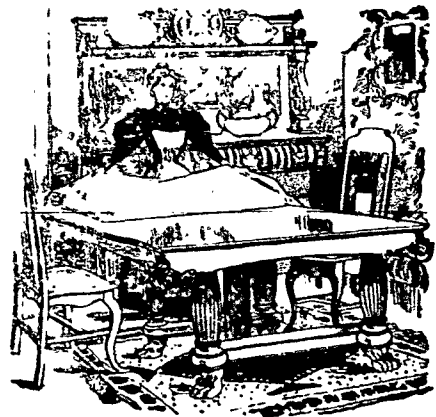

School closed Wednesday for the Easter vacation.

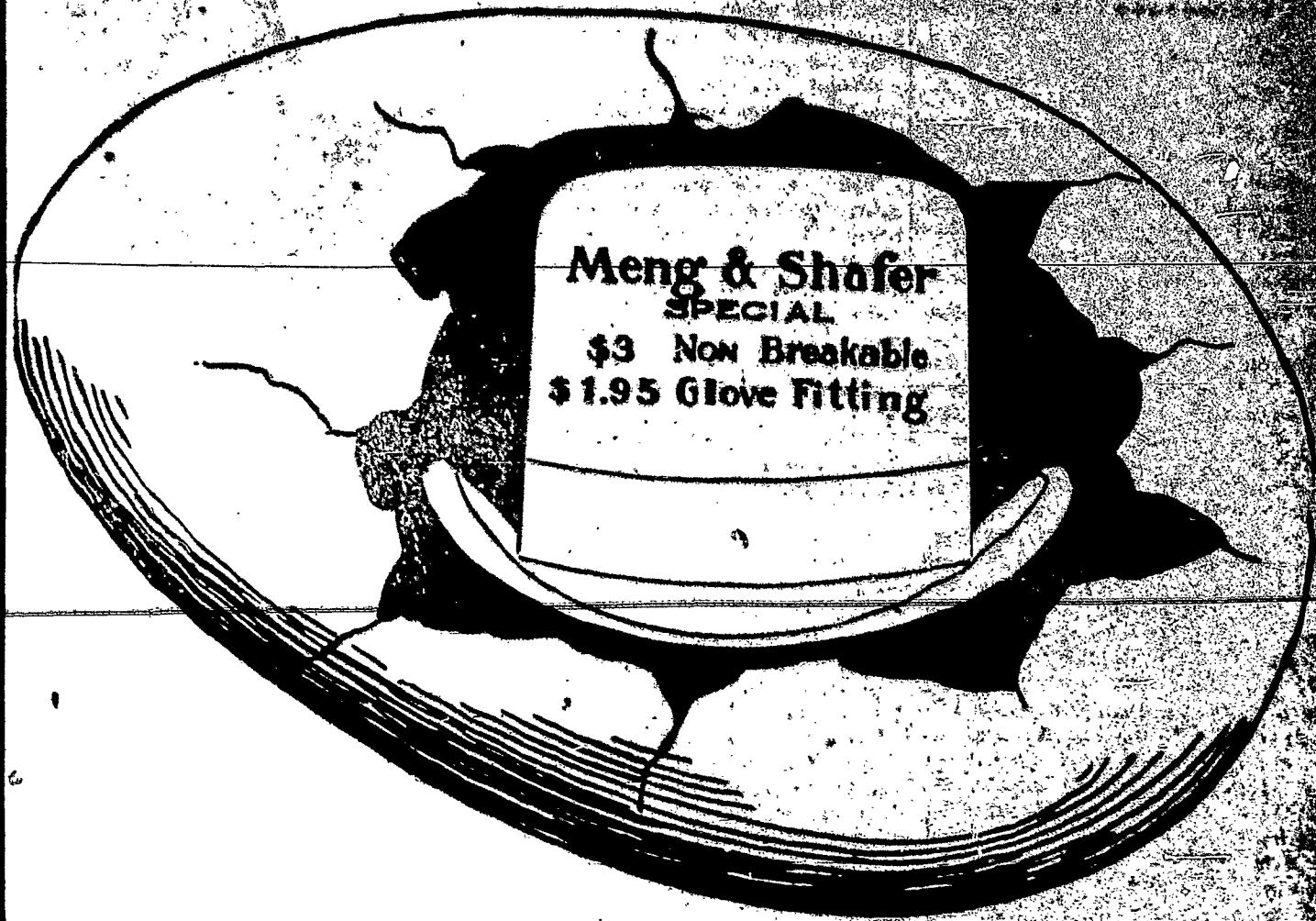
Sister M. Canisius left for Gabrielle, N. Y., after attending the funeral of her mother.
