The Saints Marie Reading Circle held a very successful pedro party on Monday evening last.

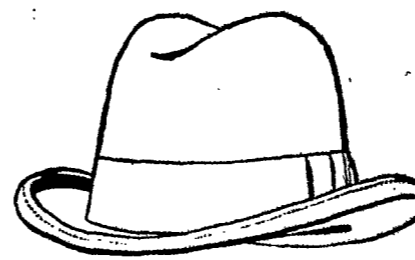
