Some particular facts about them, and also regarding pedestrian skirts.

Unlined Long Skirts.

In lengths from 39 to 45 inches.

Gray and oxford homespuns, seven gored, flare skirts with lapped seams, bound on inside, \$5.

Gray mixed homespun skirt trimmed with four satin bands in graduated flounce effect, \$5.

Blue, black and gray brilliantine skirts, trimmed around bottom with five satin bands, \$5.

Black brilliantine skirt with graduated flounce, finished around bottom with nine rows of stitching, \$5.

Gray cheviot skirt, trimmed with three bands of taffeta silk in graduated widths, \$6.

Tan and gray etamine skirts—graduated flounce, lapped seams, \$7.

Plain black serge skirt with stitched seams, \$6 and \$8.

Black serge skirt—graduated flounce headed with three bands of black satin, \$12.

Pedestrian Skirts.

In lengths from 36 to 41 inches.

Brown mixed oxford and cadet melton pedestrian skirt—nine rows of stitching around bottom, lapped seams, \$2.95.

Brown mixed and oxford melton pedestrian skirt—flare flounce with fourteen rows of stitching, lapped seams, \$4.50.

Oxford and brown mixed, plaid black, melton pedestrian skirt—five rows of stitching around bottom, \$5.

Oxford plaid black, melton pedestrian skirt—finished around bottom with band scalloped at the top and having six rows of stitching, \$7.

Oxford brown mixed and black cheviot pedestrian skirt—seams strapped and stitched, ten cords around bottom, \$9.50.

Black kersey pedestrian skirt with flounce finished with eighteen rows of fine stitching, \$12.

Black kersey pedestrian skirt—bottom scalloped with flounce set under fourteen rows of stitching, \$16.50.

ST. MICHAEL'S.

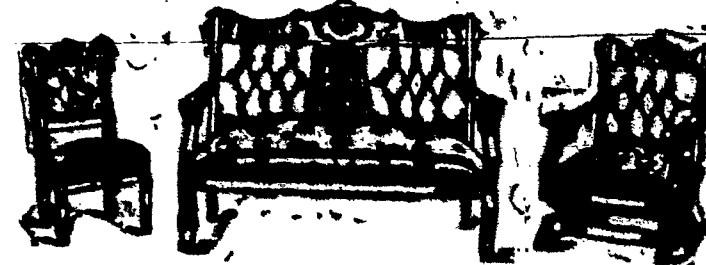

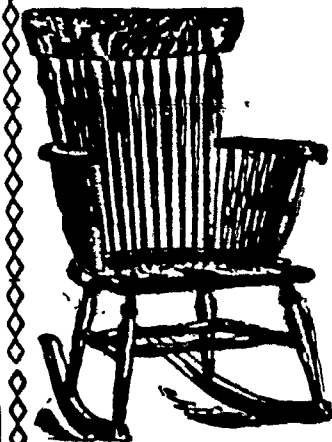

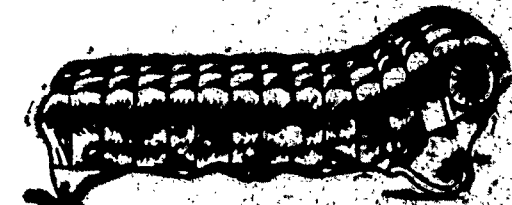
