TO THE MEMORY OF DON BOSCO.
The new Church of St. Francis at Valsalca, which has been erected over the tomb of Don Bosco and recently opened by Cardinal Richelmy, is one of the most handsome of modern Italian ecclesiastical edifices and forms a fitting memorial of the sainted founder of the Salesians. The style selected for the edifice is Romanesque and the design is that of Father E. Vespignani, Salesian. In the afternoon of the day of the opening over 30,000 people, mostly from Turin, flocked to pay a visit to the tomb of Don Bosco.
The new council of the K. of C. instituted at Muncie, Ind., on May's last Sunday, has 52 members.

EDUCATIONAL.
The priests who graduated from St. Francis' Seminary, Milwaukee, in 1876, will celebrate their silver jubilee this summer by holding a re-union at the seminary.
Archbishop Keane has issued an order that candidates for the priesthood in his diocese must hereafter complete their studies at St. Paul (Minn.) Seminary instead of at Montreal.
At their recent convention in St. Louis, the Catholic Knights of America unanimitously voted \$50,000 to endow a chair in the Catholic University, the money to be raised in four years.
The Premonstratensian Fathers, who established St. Norbert's College in Depere, Wis., two years ago, will at once commence the erection of a large and commodious new building, costing about \$25,000.
Seton Hall College, South Orange, N. J., has just purchased the country place of late Eugene Kelly, the New York millionaire. The property embraces five acres of land and adjoins the grounds already owned by the college. Within the next two years a law school will be added to the college. Eventually other schools will be added, so that the college will be an active competitor of the universities.

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
