DEATH OF D. C. FEELY.

Prominent Member of Monroe County Passes Away.

Dennis C. Feely, one of the best known lawyers of this city, died Monday morning at his home, 79 Lexington Avenue, from uraemic poisoning, aged 64 years.

The news of the death of Mr. Feely brought expressions of sorrow from lawyers throughout the county. Although it came as a surprise, it was not wholly unexpected as Mr. Feely had been a sufferer from kidney trouble for many years. He had been confined to his home only a few days.

Dennis Carroll Feely was born in Garrison, County Fermanagh, province of Ulster, Ireland, on August 25, 1837. While still a young man he became prominent in the councils of the party advocating freedom of Ireland. His activity caused the British government some concern and in order to avoid trouble he emigrated to Canada with his parents.

He received his college education in Victoria College, Cobourg. He took up the study of law and was graduated from the law school of the University of Toronto. He practiced law there for a few years.

During the Fenian uprising of 1865-66 Mr. Feely took an active part. In anything which looked to the liberty of Ireland or the amelioration of its inhabitants Mr. Feely was an ardent partisan. After the Fenian uprising was suppressed by this government, Mr. Feely left Toronto and came to this city, where he was admitted to the bar in 1868. Since then he has continually practiced law, building up an excellent clientele.

Besides his wife, Catherine Fleming Feely, Mr. Feely's family consists of four sons and two daughters, Joseph M., Emmett F., Edward F., James F., Clara and Marguerite Feely. His only other surviving relatives are his three sisters, Mother De Chantal of Auburn; Mrs. Maurice Mullins of Brooklyn; and Mrs. Elizabeth P. O'Brien of this city, and two nephews, Maurice Feely O'Brien and Jay C. F. O'Brien and a niece, Mary Mullins.

There was a large attendance of friends and acquaintances Wednesday morning at the church at 9.30 o'clock. A large number of the members of the local profession was present, and the Rochester Bar Association was represented by a committee consisting of Hon. Arthur E. Sutherland, Hon. John M. Murphy, Hon. George E. Benton, Joseph A. Adlington and Roy C. Webster. Mr. Feely was a prominent member of this organization.

Solemn requiem mass was celebrated by Rev. John J. Van Ness, pastor of the church, with Rev. Father John O'Brien as deacon, and Rev. Father Thomas Connors as sub-deacon, and Thomas Timmins of Auburn was master of ceremonies.

The church choir sang the Gregorian mass, under the direction of J. P. MacGweney, and was assisted by Prof. Eugene Bonn and M. L. Hughes. Miss Alice Connors was organist. During the mass the following solos were rendered: "Agnus Dei," Miss Fannie Moran; "Dies Irae," J. P. MacGweney; "De Profundis," P. McArdle. As the remains were carried from the church the sacred solo, "There is a Land Mine Eye Hath Seen," was rendered by Miss Margaret Heveron.

The following clergymen of the diocese were present in the sanctuary during the mass: Rev. T. A. Hendrick, Owen P. Farron, A. E. Breen and John P. Brophy, Rochester; J. J. Brennan, Churchville; William Mulherio, Auburn; M. C. J. Wall, Stanley.

The bearers were John M. Murphy, John Keon, Joseph P. Cleary, M. L. Hughes, H. P. Mulligan and J. P. O'Connor. Interment was made at Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

LARGE CROWD AT SEA BREEZE IN SPITE OF RAIN.

Eloquent speeches—Great interest in the Athletic Events—supreme President Hynes of Buffalo Gave Stirring Address.

In spite of the rain a large crowd attended the twelfth annual outing of the C. M. B. A. Tuesday at Sea Breeze. It is estimated that 3,000 people were out during the day, the rain of course keeping away a large number. Several out-of-town members were also present, among them being Supreme President John J. Hynes of Buffalo. They were met at the station by a committee and escorted to the grounds. During the afternoon two earnest and enthusiastic speeches were given, one by Supreme President Hynes and the other by Rev. John P. Brophy, President Hynes spoke of the present condition of the association, set forth its object and benefits, and called upon the people for a more earnest and hearty support in all the work of the organization.

Rev. Father Brophy also spoke of the good work the organization is doing, and enforced the words of the first speaker in bringing out the ideals and aims of the order, dwelling at some length upon the responsibilities that lay open to them as Catholics if they would only stand firm and give the association their loyal support.

Rev. M. J. Hargather was to have spoken also, but was called out of the city.
