Donegal, the ancient town of the Four Masters, was the place visited by the members of the Derry branches of the Gaelic League, Sunday, June 30. Close on six hundred members started from the Waterside Station, Derry, at 9.15 a. m., and arrived in Donegal at midday, where they were received by brethren from Ballyshannon, Mountcharles, Killybegs, Ardara, Glentir, Stremerlar, Killymard, Townarvilly, etc. A good number joined the excursion at Strabane and intermediate stations. A public meeting was held in a field, opposite the old Abbey of Donegal, lent by Mr. Connail Cannon. Rt. Rev. Mgr. Hugh McFadden, P. P., preaided. Resolutions were unanimously adopted by the three thousand persons present to preserve the Irish language from destruction by founding branches of the Gaelic League; calling upon the managers and teachers of national schools to have Irish taught in every school: protesting against the unfair treatment of Irish in the Intermediate programme; and urging that preference be given to Irish manufactured goods.
