THE K. OF C.

Bishop Tierney Approves of the Order and Encourages His People to Join It.

Bishop Tierney of Hartford was asked recently how he regarded the Knights of Columbus, regarding which order Bishop Janina of Belleville Ill. has expressed his disapproval. Informing the priest of his diocese that he does not want the order established within his jurisdiction.

Bishop Tierney said he approved of the order and encouraged his people to join it, and he knew of no reason why anyone should not approve of it. The council of bishops, he said, has never taken any action in regard to the order, hence while it has not been approved by the Church officially, neither has it been condemned, or the fact would be announced. The adverse attitude of one bishop, he said, would constitute his personal disapproval, but no condemnation, and he saw no likelihood of the order being condemned, for so far as he knew, without being a member of it, there is nothing in its tenets that was in opposition to the Church while there was much in its workings to be commended. While it is not within the lines of the Church he said, as a church society, no one is expected to be a member of it unless he complies with his religious duties as a Catholic. Several priests of the diocese, he said, and, in fact, a number of his household, are members of the order and if there was anything about it to condemn he thought they would not be slow to do so.

A CHANCE FOR THE BOY.

Six free day-student scholarships at St. John's college, Fordham, will be open for competitive examination at the college on September 4th, 5th, and 6th. They are open to all graduates of parochial, private and public schools in good standing, irrespective of the creed of the candidates. The competitors attaining the highest six percentages will receive four years instruction in the high school, or academic department, and upon the completion of that term, the full college course of four years, leading to the degree of bachelor of arts—in all, eight years' instruction free of any charge for tuition. Prospective candidates can obtain full information as to subjects of examinations, etc., by communicating at once with the secretary of the college. These scholarships, which are perpetual, were created by gift to the college in memory of the late Father Dealy, S. J., a former well-known president of St. John's, Hon. William R. Grace donated the \$10,000 to found these scholarships.
