Early on the morning of the 9th the military pageant will be formed. It will be the grandest picture of New York's soldiery that has ever been witnessed outside of New York city. Squadron A of New York city with its mounted band, the crack cavalry or ganization of the State, will be one of the features of the parade. The Second battery of New York and other separate organizations will be on hand. In addition to these will be all of the Fourth brigade, national guard of the State, together with all of the military now present at the Exposition. Major General Charles F. Roe will act as grand marshal of the day.

This great army of soldiers will act as the Governor's escort from the city to the Exposition grounds, where the Governor and staff will review the troops in the Stadium. The line of march will be from Niagara square up Main street and Delaware avenue, entering the Exposition grounds at the beautiful Lincoln gate, through which President McKinley passed upon his last visit to the grounds.

Shortly after the Governor and his escort reach the grounds the exercises of the day will begin in the Temple of Music. Accompanying the Governor will be many distinguished citizens of New York State, who will take part'in the day's programme. Lieutenant Governor Woodruff, United States Sebators Platt and Depew and many others will be on hand. At the Temple of Music brief speeches will be made by Gov ernor Odell, Senator Depew, John G. Milburn, president of the Exposition Company; Hon. Daniel N. Lockwood. president of the New York State Board of Genural Managers, and the oration of the day will be delivered by the Hon. St. Clair McKelway of Brooklyn. The programme will be interspersed with the best music to be had from among the many superb bands and orchestras now attending the Exposition.

Gold Statues In New York Building, Two life sized statues of pure gold bullion are the newest addition to the art department of the New York State building at the Pan-American Exposi tion. The installation of these figures was a surprise, for which the Hon Daniel N. Lockwood, president of the New York State Commission to the Exposition, is largely responsible. The figures show a complete departure from the conventional in sculpture, as they are neither nude onor draped. The statues represent types of the North and South American woman of today.

The North American girl is clad in street dress of the latest mode, from hat to heavy walking shoes. The lady of South America is arrayed in full evening dress, including fan and the inevitable mantilla.

The model chosen for the North American girl was Miss Etta Reed, beautiful young society woman, who is well known in Washington. The name of the lady who represented South America before the sculpter is not divulged, for political reasons it is said. but it is known that she is one of the most beautiful and popular women of South America.

Both the, statues were modeled from life by R. Hinton Perry, whose statue of President Arthur is a conspicuous figure in Madison Square Garden, New York
