The chalice is of pure gold, thirteen inches high, the golbet portion being surrounded by an extremely artistic piece of carving of the Last Supper. The foot supports four figures, symbolizing the four doctors of the Church, St. Augustine, St. Gregory, St. Ambrose, and St. Jerome, and at the base there

Die 13 October, 1901.' The following is the translation: "Abraham, Bishop of Ossory, as a sign of his great love, presents this chalice to the mother church of Ossory."
