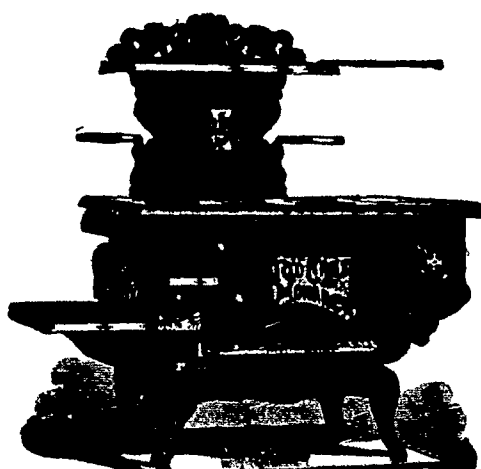

Besides her husband the deceased leaves a large circle of friends to mourn her loss. The floral tributes were many and beautiful. Burial took place at Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

The Pedro party to have been given by Corpus Christi Branch, 251 L. O. B. A., for members and their friends, was postponed to Oct. 30, on account of the weather.

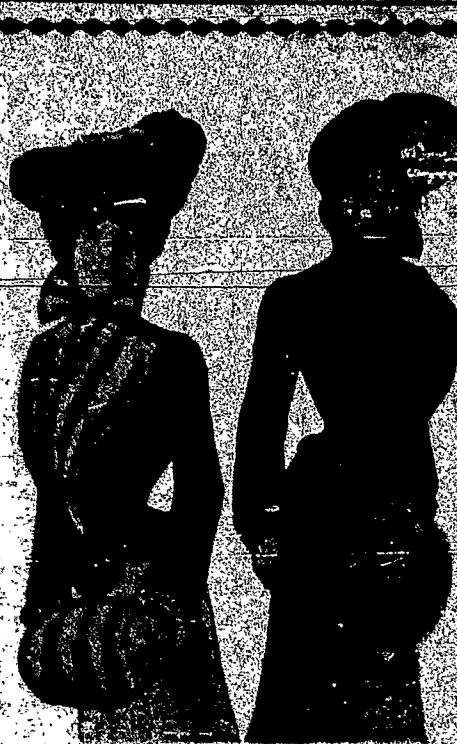
ST. MONICA'S.
