WRITING FOR DEGREES.

First Examinations of This Nature Held at St. Bernard's.

The first written examination for the conferring of degrees were held at St. Bernard's Seminary last Saturday, beginning at 8:15 o'clock in the morning. Rev. Father Potter wrote a thesis covering the Department of Holy Scriptures, dogmatic theology and moral theology. He had his oral examination on Thursday, May 29th. Father Potter seeks to obtain the degree of licentiate of theology.

On Thursday, May 29th, Messrs. Edward Byrne, John Gaffell, Peter Hand, Robert Henry and Andrew Lago were examined for the degree of bachelor of philosophy. The examining board was made up of the faculty of the college, Rev. Dr. Nolan and Gaffell, of the Cathedral; Rt. Rev. Bishop Quigley, of Buffalo; Rt. Rev. Bishop Ludden, of Syracuse; Very Rev. Mgr. Lynch, of Utica; Rev. Dr. Hoelscher, of Buffalo, and Rt. Rev. Bishop Gabriels, of Ogdensburg.

Classes will close at St. Bernard's on Saturday, May 31st. The week following will be devoted to ordinary examinations and during the next week a spiritual retreat will be given to all the students. The ordinations will be held on June 14th.

Mr. Goggin Graduated.

A special cable despatch from Rome announces that St. Ray Charles E. McDonnell, of Brooklyn, who is now in Rome, obtained a number of American students to the Roman Catholic priesthood, among them being John Goggin, of Rochester.

Father Goggin had a brilliant record in St. Andrew's seminary here and was selected by Bishop McQuaid to pursue higher studies abroad. He will probably return to Rochester where he will be assigned to clerical duty for a few months, returning to Europe next fall to study for his degree as doctor in theology.
